
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

# GF MORGAN : MAGENTA

On March 17th 2024 Gf Morgan released his new solo album *Magenta* to the public at a CD release party at Dharma Bums in New Hope, PA.

The album is reflective of Morgan's work as a solo artist with selected pieces from his vast repertoire which includes arrangements of ballads, sea chanteys, original compositions and the traditional music of the Celtic lands.

Coming on the heels of his critically acclaimed album *Driftwood*, the new album *Magenta* showcase features his delicate finger style guitar playing as well as his versatility on concertina and several instruments of the mandolin family.

The praise from both sides of the Atlantic for *Driftwood* brought Morgan to the notice of the American Celtic scene.

Magenta has met with similar plaudits.



Sheridan Rúitín is a Celtic folk band from Rockland County, NewYork. The band was formed in 2020 and consists of five members: Billy Houlihan (vocals, banjo, bouzouki, fiddle, bagpipes), Shannon Cokeley (vocals, guitar), Tommy Ma (vocals, bodhrán), Michael Zayas (accordion, mandolin), and John Damiano (drums).

The band is known for their traditional Irish sound and their unique blend of folk and rock influences. Their music has been described as being "rooted in tradition and fueled by innovation, weaving a tapestry of ancient musical



heritage with contemporary flair – from lively jigs and reels to poignant ballads and ethereal harmonies."

In March of 2022, Sheridan Rúitín released their debut album, *Rebels in the Night*, which received critical acclaim and helped to establish the band as one of the leading Celtic folk/Celtwave groups of the greater New York area. They have also released a live album, 3 EPs, and several singles all while touring extensively throughout the United States. They have performed at several major music festivals, including the East Durham Irish Festival, Poconos Irish Festival, Bergen County Irish Festival, and the Hooley on the Hudson.

Their upcoming *Keep 'Er Lit* tour will have Sheridan Rúitín performing festivals and concerts throughout the United States and Canada; including Havertown Irish Festival, Rockaway Beach Irish Festival, Gavinstock & more.

It was in SF where she gained exposure to Celtic music – and began performing alongside artists such as The Black Brothers and Richard Mandel.

Erin's hometown of Tucson, AZ is enriched in Mexican tradition, but not a great deal of Celtic culture. However, as a child she was aware of her Celtic heritage. Erin's mother (a classical pianist and songwriter) brought

home Celtic albums and films. Even at a young age Erin was fascinated by the sounds of Celtic music.

Erin released a self-funded album of Irish and Folk classics in 2020, with limited outlets for exposure during the pandemic. 

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

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

Celebrated Newfoundland band Rum Ragged releases, *Gone Jiggin'* - a brand new 12-song album that is available to stream and buy now.



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Throughout *Gone Jiggin'*, the sing-alongs sit alongside the story songs, perfectly balanced. Age-old ballads like *The Dewy Dells of Yarrow* and *The Green Shores of Fogo* are paired perfectly with close-to-the-floor reels played with surgical precision on accordion, fiddle, and banjo. Compositions by Newfoundland icons accordionist Minnie White and fiddler Emile Benoit can be heard in the tune set *The Viking Jig/West Bay Centre*.

These are songs arranged and created with devotion and honour, celebrating one of the most unique places on earth, told through its oldest artistic tradition. With *Gone Jiggin'*, Rum Ragged further cements their place in the pantheon of traditional music, becoming part of a story that will carry on.

### THE COMPANION TO IRISH TRADITIONAL MUSIC (EDITED BY FINTAN VALLELY) www.comitm.com

Twenty five years ago in 1999 the *Companion to Irish Traditional Music* was launched, the first A-Z encyclopedia-style reference book for Irish Traditional Music. In 2011 it was re-released—updated and expanded, with digital versions also on Kindle and iBooks.

Now, in response to demand, a third edition has been compiled substantially revised, expanded and re-focused on contemporary issues and practices. Edited again by musician Fintan Vallely, the *Companion* is the largest single collection of such diverse data. It brings together the knowledge of 215 musicians and writers in 600,000 words with 840 biographies and a thousand other articles, three hundred images and music transcriptions.

Its eighteen hundred entries cover the full gamut of Traditional music in Ireland and internationally, dealing with: all tune types; style, composition and arrangement; ballads, sean-nós and Irish-language song; step and seannós dance, céilí and sets; solo playing and sessions; competitions and awards; céilí bands, groups and professionalism; instruments; technology; organisations, media and promotion; teaching and learning; education and transmission; collectors and archives; history and revival; performers, stylists and commentators; broadcasting and recording; women in traditional music; Irish music in all Irish counties and diaspora cities worldwide.

Uniquely, the book carries the only complete bibliography of Irish music, song and dance literature and tutors, and has the first ever analysis of All-Ireland fleadh results 1951–2023, as well as a listing of the major senior winners over the fleadh's 72 years.

Much of the music notated in the book can be listened to as well—on an accompanying digital-download album which is also separately available as both a double CD and DVD.

An avid musician, dancer, and singer, Adrienne has spent her life immersed in tradition and culture culminating in her debut release, *Threads of Gold*.

Threads of Gold includes a handpicked variety of songs from sean-nós to Appalachian "that moves, challenges, and reveals a singer who would seem to revel in the stories behind the songs as much as she does the songs themselves." - Daniel Neely, The Irish Echo. Adrienne's musicality reveals a transcontinental experience, seeped in old-world style and infused with young, modern energy. She uses a clear voice and mature musicality to communicate the delicacy and complexity of traditional song.

Arranged in collaboration with Brian Miller, and Dáithí Sproule, these expert singers, accompanists, and masters of tradition helped give life to Adrienne's performance of these songs. Recorded at the Hideaway Studios in Minneapolis, MN, *Threads of Gold* was produced by artist Danny Diamond and was released in June, 2023.

Threads of Gold is a comprehensive and unique album put forth by a new and bold young voice in Adrienne O'Shea. Jason has been a consistent presence at the Goderich Celtic Roots Festival since 1996, showcasing his talents as an artist. Over the span of 28 years, his dedication to goldsmithing has yielded remarkable improvement, reflecting his commitment to craftsmanship and artistic growth. Goderich holds a special significance for Jason, as it's where his family is from, and he spent his summers growing up there. Consequently, it has remained one of the only shows he attends outside of working at his workshop, maintaining a cherished connection to his roots and community.

For the past 5 years at the Goderich Celtic College (the 4 days leading up to the Festival), Jason has taught a silversmithing course with a limit of 8 students per session. Students learn how to handmake a lost wax cast sterling silver ring and a pendant as well. Celtic Patterns are easy to learn with practice.

Applications to the Music Capital Scheme which provides funding for musical instruments to both community music groups and individual musicians will open soon.

Established in 2008, the Music Capital Scheme is supported by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media and managed by Music Network. Since it was established the scheme has made 544 awards to individual musicians and organisations providing access to instruments for over 51,000 people across the country.

Beneficiaries range from early years to mature players including musicians with physical and intellectual disabilities. 205 performing groups have been able to purchase instruments and expand their memberships, and 202 professional established and emerging musicians advanced their performance careers with new instruments enabled by the scheme. Previous awardees include The Bluestack Special Needs Foundation, renowned button accordion player Daithí Gormley and rising star cellist Grace Coughlan, who all received funding in the last round of the scheme.

# **SCOIL SAMHRAIDH WILLIE CLANCY** July 6th-13th, Miltown Malbay, County Clare

Seán Laffey in conversation with Harry Hughes for Irish Music Magazine.



arry Hughes, Martin Talty and the late Muiris Ó Rócháin, founded Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy in 1973. There's nothing like Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy. Running now for 52 years, it was created to celebrate the memory and continue the legacy of Miltown Malbay uilleann piper Willie Clancy. It is without doubt the pre-eminent music event for traditional musicians in the country. Over a week, the seaside town in West Clare hosts thousands of musicians who come to learn new tunes, learning them from masters of their craft, they also hear lectures full of deep insights into the character of the music and the people who have played it. Then there are those legendary sessions, and those musical friendships that reignite year after year ,whether it be in the back room of a crowded pub or at breakfast on the campsite. Music is everywhere in Miltown Malbay in July, and Harry Hughes knows the summer school inside and out.

You instinctively know an organiser has their finger on the pulse of an event when they talk so enthusiastically about their plans and that is exactly the impression I got when talking to Harry, a nudge here and there, and he's off with anecdotes and examples,. He sees the connections the Summer School has made with the international world of Irish traditional music, and he takes in a modern perspective, right down to the social and commercial geography of Miltown itself. Of course the town has changed over the past half century. And there's no doubt the Summer School has helped in this, there's a welcome economic boost every July, but there's more of course. Miltown isn't frozen in time, it reflects modern Ireland. Visitors will notice improved infrastructure and facilities but they may also see that there has been a decline of the family pub. Traditional music however endures, and the quality of the experience a visitor has when they come to Miltown Malbay in July will last a lifetime.

There are concerts and recitals every day, these often are single instrument concerts. For example the fiddle concert features some 40 players, each one is a master of the instrument. As many of the attendees are in Miltown Malbay to be immersed in the music and lore of their chosen instrument, these concerts are undiluted windows into the pure drop, and are always fully sold out.

With so much going on during the week, I asked Harry to highlight a few events that will be of interest to our readers. That is an easy question

for him as he has the details of talks, lectures and recitals at his fingertips. "The summer school will be opened at 8pm on Saturday 6th July by Peter Browne, renowned uilleann piper and former RTÉ presenter and producer. This will be followed by our annual Breandán Breathnach Memorial Lecture. As you know, Breandán was a collector and author of the invaluable volumes *Ceol Rince na hÉireann*. He collected some 7000 tunes in his lifetime, many directly from traditional players.

"The Memorial Lecture will be presented by Gay McKeon, CEO, and Emmett Gill, Archivist, of Na Píobairí Uilleann. It is called 'Uilleann pipers and piping in Clare and Dublin 1930 – 1973'. This is the period covering two generations before the Willie Clancy Summer School, and Gay and Emmett will show that there were strong links between pipers in the East and West of the country long before the founding of NPU in 1968 or the summer school in 1973."

The importance of Clare as a repository of traditional music and song will be highlighted in a special lecture presented by two Scotsmen, Peter Shepheard & Jimmy Hutchison, from St. Andrews. Harry explains their importance. "Their research goes back to August 1964 when they went down to the Fleadh in Scariff, taking a portable tape recorder with them, and where they were able to record music in the bars, at the song competitions, and of traveller singers in the streets. In Scariff they met the broadcaster Ciarán MacMathuna who took them down to Miltown Malbay where they spent many hours - usually in Tom Queally's Bar recording singers and musicians, including Willie Clancy, Seán 'ac Dhonncha, Joe Cuneen, Terry Wilson, Seán Keane, Mick Flynn, Tim Lyons and Jimmy Ward, among many others. Pete and Jimmy will talk of those times and play audio clips of some of the singers and musicians they recorded. Friends and families of those musicians that were captured on tape 60 years ago will be in attendance and I am sure it will bring back some very special memories."

Other talks to attend are: "An exploration of the social and artistic context of Irish traditional music in early 20th century New York City". This is on Monday 8th July and will be presented by Chelsey Zimmerman, musician and doctoral researcher in Irish traditional music at the University of Limerick. New York was a key destination for Irish musicians before the First World War and some of the big names of the tradition made their lives there, such as Coleman, Morrison and Killoran. Chelsey will look at the social and community context that helped those and other musicians to thrive in metropolitan New York.

On Tuesday 9th July, Paula Carroll, broadcaster, oral historian and presenter of Clare FM's traditional music programme The West Wind, will present a musical tribute to the Tulla Céilí Band, which will be an afternoon of music, song and dance.

The famous Clare Céilí Band performed at the first summer school in 1973 and since then has been a major attraction on the school's céilithe programmes.

Harry tells us about another international perspective on Irish traditional music. "We look outward to Irish music in Quebec on Wednesday when Professor Kate Bevan-Baker will present a talk called 'Ireland and Quebec: Connections and intersections through traditional music'. Then our Thursday lecture will look at the music of Margaret Barry, whom I saw on a couple of occasions and whose memory and legacy need rekindling. She was an important cog in the folk revival in Ireland and was known internationally. She even appeared at the Newport Folk Festival in the USA. The talk is by Alan Woods, Artist Liaison & Field Recording Officer at the Irish Traditional Music Archive. And he will be joined by singer songwriter Lisa O'Neill. He will present 'With the banjo on my side: The life and times of Margaret Barry'.

"There are opportunities for traditional musicians and teachers to take part in *Know the Score*, which this year is again taught by Dr Liz Doherty. This course is certified by the Royal Irish Academy of Music. Another programme is Dúchas an Cheoil (The Heritage of Irish Music). This is an ideal forum in which to learn about the history and evolution of Irish traditional music, song and dance, and the personalities, organisations and events that have shaped that history and narrative of Irish traditional music. The tutors are Paddy Glackin and Cathal Goan. Cathal has written on a number of aspects of the Donegal song tradition and served for many years as chairman of the Irish Traditional Music Archive. He was a founding director of TG4 and also Director General of RTÉ. This course is accredited by the University of Limerick through their Blas Summer School." Full details at www.blas.ie

The final concert of the summer school is the Ceolchoirm Chuimhneacháin Muiris Ó Rócháin (Muiris Ó Rócháin Memorial Concert). It will run from 7 pm to 10.30 pm at the Community Centre on July 13th. Officially it will round out the week, but sessions have been known to go on for days afterwards!

# **CELTIC WORLD FORUM**

The Celtic World Forum runs from September 5th – 7th, 2024 at the Irish Institute of Music & Song. Gráinne McCool was delighted to get the opportunity to question Éabha McMahon about the upcoming event.



eltic World Forum is an annual event that brings together Celtic music enthusiasts, experts and artists to explore and celebrate the rich and diverse traditions of Celtic music. Created by Grammy nominated Irish singer Éabha McMahon, the Celtic World to Ireland, through ancestry for instance. But above and beyond that, the music often resonates with people in all corners of the globe that have no familial ties to Ireland. Quite often in a Gaelic language they do not understand, yet somehow feel the exact emotion the song was written to convey."

Gráinne: "Is the forum solely for Irish musicians?"

**Éabha:** "Not exclusively, but obviously we do have an emphasis on Celtic music from an Irish perspective. That is the music I grew up with and anyone that knows me realises how passionate I am about the various forms that Irish music has given the world. There is such a wealth of new undiscovered talent in Ireland that I want an international audience to discover as well."

**Gráinne:** "Can the forum reach out to other events throughout the year?"

**Éabha:** "Our ultimate goal is to be able to bring this format to other countries either as part of an established festival, or as a stand-alone event. Last December we held a sold out 'Celtic World at Christmas' concert in Galway, featuring many of the performers that took part in our CWF23. That is something that we will repeat this year. We are also recording music under the 'Celtic World' name and are planning a series of releases throughout the year."

**Gráinne:** "What does a forum like this bring to the participating musicians and artists?"

Forum focuses on creating unforgettable experiences in the form of unique events and concerts, using only the highest quality of Irish talent, with many of the performers being globally established names from the most successful international touring shows.

**Gráinne:** "What was the incentive behind the Celtic World Forum?" **Éabha:** "I had always wanted to do something that had a creative and educational element to it. My manager, and co-founder, Shane McDonnell and myself, both felt strongly that we wanted to create a unique event that would hold as much appeal for a music listener as it would for a music player. Our key objectives were to host an event that would be informative, inspiring and entertaining in equal measure."

Gráinne: "Was the inaugural event a success last year?"

**Éabha:** "The feedback from everyone who attended last year was overwhelmingly positive. The talks, workshops and panels were all interesting, informative, inspiring, and entertaining. One of the highlights last year were the song circles we finished each daytime with. This is where artists and attendees would gather in a beautiful acoustic amphitheatre at the IIMS to share songs, stories and dances and where everyone was welcome to either participate or just enjoy. The three evening concerts were quite simply outstanding, with an array of amazing artists on each night.

"Shane and I have witnessed the huge appeal of Celtic music in every corner of the world, and whilst many people think of Ireland when they consider Celtic music, it may just be the only Celtic region that, until now, has not had an event that celebrates its worldwide interest. Sometimes people have a defined reason why they feel so connected **Éabha**: "It brings a rare and unique opportunity to connect with an audience that truly love and admire the music that they perform. As an artist myself I have found that there is so much to learn by engaging with the people who listen to your music, and it was an affirming experience for the artists who took part last year. Not only that, but also great friendships were formed by artists who may otherwise never have met, bonds that continue to this day. From a musical side, I am proud to be part of a supportive community that creates what is in their hearts. As we cautiously approach a future of artificial intelligence, it is so important to preserve that sense of history, tradition, and humanity in the creative arts." **Gráinne:** "Is the weekend open to the general public and where can they find out more about it?"

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# **WOLF LOESCHER'S** *IMMIGRANT SONGS*

Seán Laffey puts a zoom call into Colorado and discovers the fascinating backstory behind Wolf Loescher's album *Immigrant Songs*.



ongtime readers of IMM may recall Wolf's name in relation to the Texas Celtic band Jiggernaut, a band he founded in Houston back in 2000 with Deanna Smith-Scotland (Free Whiski) and Matthew Williams (The Blarney Brothers).

Immigrant Songs is Wolf's third solo album, created with help from several friends he's made on the festival circuit and the club scene in

from the local library. We had the opportunity to see The Corries perform live twice, and that really hooked me on Celtic Folk music. It was a huge thrill to have them sign that poster for me."

Unable to tour and promote his second solo album *Sheep's Clothing* (released in March 2020) due to the COVID lockdown, Wolf began playing regular Facebook livestream shows (which continue to this day). He calls it *The Howl*, named in honour of a local early Pandemic custom where people would open their windows at 8pm every night and howl like wolves to show their support for first responders and health care workers. He self-financed *Immigrant Songs* through a Kickstarter campaign, and he recorded all his tracks (vocals, Irish bouzouki, baritone ukulele, drums, and percussion) in his home studio in Colorado. He called in several musical friends from 30 years of playing to help him create the album. Guest musicians include Brian McNeill, Rich Brotherton, Beth Patterson, Tim Britton, Frances Cunningham, Kendall Rodgers, Mari Black, EJ Jones, Leah Rankin, and Scooter Muse (who also mixed and mastered the album in his recording studio in Tuscumbia, Alabama).

The album looks at the American immigrant experience from different perspectives, with songs that range from Steve Earle's *City of Immigrants* (featuring Tim Britton's masterful Zydeco-style uilleann piping), to '39 (penned by Queen guitarist and astrophysicist Brian May). There are references to key times in American history where immigrants have made a real difference. We'll close with Wolf's commentary on the track *Sutter's Mill*, a song by Dan Fogelberg that commemorates the water powered sawmill where Californian gold was first discovered in 1849.

"I have a personal connection to the California Gold Rush, since an ancestor on my mother's side – Robert "Stumpy Bob" Lawlor – immigrated from County Laois in Ireland to Chicago to escape The Famine, and then went to California to find his fortune."

Wolf, playing with the Piper Jones Band, will appear at the San Diego Highland Games (June 22-23) and the Grandfather Mountain

the US. The title *Immigrant Songs* might seem an obvious choice when playing to an audience that cherishes its Celtic heritage, but for Wolf things are more personal, as he explains.

"My father's family were from East Prussia in Germany and were displaced for about 8 years after WWII. In 1953, the Lutheran Church sponsored German families, helping them relocate to the USA. The family immigrated to Detroit, and although he didn't speak a word of English, my father got a job working in an iron foundry at the age of 16. A few years later he joined the US Army and served as radio operator in Korea. Thanks to the GI Bill, he got a degree in Electrical Engineering, which led to a job working on the radio systems that were used in NASA's Apollo program (which took men to the moon)."

As the conversation develops, I notice a poster on the wall behind his right shoulder, it is for a Corries gig in Scotland. "I got that poster at a concert back in the early 1980s, when I was an immigrant myself. My dad was promoted to general manager of a brand-new semiconductor plant in Scotland's "Silicon Glen", and the family moved from Central Texas to East Kilbride (a "new town" just south of Glasgow). At first, I couldn't understand the thick Scottish accent – it was a major culture shock for all of us. My mom suggested we learn about the culture of Scotland and started borrowing albums of Scottish and Irish folk music

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# THIS SECRET FROM GRÁINNE HUNT

Gráinne Hunt is an accomplished songwriter, her voice has been compared to Tracy Chapman, Natalie Merchant and Dolores Keane, writes Anne Marie Kennedy for Irish Music Magazine.



er 2019 album of original songs *This Secret* was recorded in Nashville with the Grammy nominated Thomm Jutz.

Gráinne says she has "always been a singer, in choirs, community games shows, the called-upon student in school. I always say I had a sheltered musical childhood, growing up with Irish folk and ballad singers and not really exposed to other music until I got to university when I discovered the likes of Joni Mitchell, Billie Holiday and Tom Waits, while continuing to follow Irish names like Damien Rice, The Frames, Mundy and Paddy Casey, that first *Other Voices* CD held a host of gems!" She speaks again of being lucky in the business, having the good fortune to meet the producer Thomm Jutz in Belfast, from where her recording *This Secret* emerged. Writing the songs took about a year and a half, the subsequent recording and finished product was "a really laid back process, working with the Nashville professionals and having Thomm at the helm, we recorded and mixed the whole thing in less than three days. It's very much a snapshot of that moment in time working with great musicians. It leans a bit towards country/folk, naturally, having been recorded in Nashville!"

When talking about her writing process, she puts great emphasis on the lyrics, "and having done a lot of songwriting workshops and masterclasses I've picked up many tips and tricks along the way. I'm very focused on starting with a chorus, an idea with a hook, then adding verses that make their way towards it, serving it well. Music usually comes afterwards for me, my reward for working on the lyrics! I also started an online songwriting group during Covid, www.songwritercircle.club, to motivate myself and others. It's prompt based and deadline-driven, and I write monthly for that. I've found the group really helpful in keeping motivated, it is a great way to maintain creativity, especially when I'm touring."

Apart from her solo work, Gráinne also collaborates with guitarist Brendan Walsh, a duo with a distinctly Irish flavour. She is also part of the folk duo Hibsen with Jim Murphy, their recent album *The Stern Task of Living* is a musical interpretation of James Joyce's short story collection *Dubliners*.

After college she sang in different bands, always aware of the singer within, but not doing anything about it. At age 30, she took a leap, quit the full-time office job, worked part-time and started singing backing vocals for another singer. During that time, she met folks who were interested in her material, her writing, which gave her the confidence to continue with it.

"James Cramer from Tupelo was a great encouragement and we began writing together. He helped me get my first release out and the fire's been lit since then! I feel really fortunate to have met him and others who validated my creativity. Also the last few years have seen some momentum build, I am on my debut US tour right now, having received my 0-1 Artist visa, I showcased at the Folk Alliance in February to a very full auditorium and a standing ovation. In July 2023 I performed the Cambridge Folk Festival as part of the Culture Ireland stage, a trip to Germany followed that, joining Glen Hansard at Haldern Pop's main stage, singing his songs, and then later, him and his band accompanying me on my new single *Magnets.*"

Declan O'Rourke said Gráinne has an astounding voice, "that will mill melt your heart, no crowd can resist", and the aforementioned Hansard said she is "the hardest working woman in Irish music". be performing in Europe and the UK during Summer 2024, returning to America in September for a west coast tour, gigging from Seattle to San Diego. Tours to Germany and Switzerland are being planned for October & November.

# SEÁN LYNCH'S CHONGIE ROAD

A sense of place and the personal past pervades piper Seán Lynch's *Chongie Road*. He tells Seán Laffey that moving back to Achill Island was the catalyst that drove on this album.

'd been living away from Achill for years," says Seán Lynch, adding, "getting back home and having a chance to reconnect with producer Alan Doherty gave me the catalyst to begin this project."

Seán reflects on the title track. "The tune *Chongie Road* took a while to pull into shape. It's named after the little stream that flows past my home place and into the Chongie river. Some resemblance of the tune first came to me whilst I was visiting the London Uilleann Pipers Club a number of years ago, the tune started out on the whistle and I kind of let it sit for a few years. It is descriptive, reflecting the turbulent track of the Chongie River as it flows down through the village and under a bridge in the centre of Dooagh. It then flows out into the Atlantic ocean in Dooagh Bay where it meets the horizon, an area where there appears to be no limits to what's achievable. The turning point in composing the tune was moving home to Chongie Road in the last year. I played the tune on a B set of pipes made by Andreas Rogge; this set opened up another emotional dimension in the melody for me."

The track features the voice of John 'Twin' McNamara, a master and legend of Irish music and culture on Achill Island as Seán explains. "John was the headmaster in my national school whilst growing up. He had us playing Jigs and Reels before being able to spell our own names. An inspiration to me and generations of local musicians and it is a privilege to have John feature on the album. During the project Alan Doherty and I had the pleasure of working with John as he features in the title track. We had a memorable day spending maybe 7 or 8 hours chatting, recording anecdotes and pieces of music. It was a wonderful afternoon and we came away with some sentimental archive recordings along with a recording of the Chongie Road poem written by a young local singer-songwriter, Brid McLoughlin."

How then did the *Chongie Road* album take shape? "The album itself was recorded in Áras Chrónáin Irish Cultural centre. A fantastic community centre in the middle of Clondalkin Village, Dublin. Recording and production was completed by the very talented Alan

Doherty, with the mixing and mastering being completed by the maestro Alex Borwick. I had the fantastic opportunity to be joined by such talented musicians who featured on the album and helped really enhance both the experience as a whole and the finished product. The album was recorded over a few months, basically on the basis of varying availability of the featured musicians. I believe it was an opportunity to let all the musicians be as creative as possible with the easy going approach to the overall project itself. The finishing touch for the overall project for myself was the great artwork used for the album cover, completed by local Achill artist Michael Fadian."

Achill is historically famous for the pipe bands and piping tradition as a whole, and there's a flavour of that tradition on the track *The Road To Lisdoonvarna*. "The addition of the snare drum on this track really gives that sense of home and our wonderful piping tradition on Achill."

One of the standout tracks on the album is *O'Connor's*, with its modern syncopated groove, where did Seán find it? "Much like the other tracks on the album, the idea of matching these two tunes was to have a tune of which I would have learnt whilst growing up in Dooagh, matched with a tune I would have picked up more recently while travelling for work. The first jig titled *Robbie Hannon's Jig*, I would have learnt from the Armagh Pipers Club. This was then paired with *O'Connor's* a tune I got more recently from the playing of Foxford flute player Stephen Doherty."

A young singer Bríd McLoughlin features on the album? "Yes, Bríd is only 15 and she is a prodigious talent. Bríd originally started her music career again in Achill on the whistle and then progressed onto the concertina. Where she really shines at present is in her singing and song writing which is mesmerizing for a girl of her age. We are privileged to have had Bríd join us at our recent gigs and set to join us at our upcoming gigs in Matt Molloy's, Westport and the Crane Bar, Galway in June."

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# WAY OUT WEST FROM – MOON LOOKS ON

Stephen Gormley chats to Anne Marie Kennedy for Irish Music Magazine.



W aka 'Moon Looks On', following on from his previous album *Razor Wire Skies*, which accumulated a quarter million streams on Spotify and also featured on the 'New Music Friday' playlist which signalled him as an artist to watch. Hot Press, Irish Independent, Golden Plec, Today FM, RTE, 2FM and Radio X in

Manchester have all endorsed his work. Stephen says he was "happy out as a young lad". Working with his dad Peadar Gormley on the building sites, before going on to become a fully qualified scaffolder. When the recession hit, he went to work in a building supply shop. While there he bought a guitar and a bodhrán, Orkney and Shetland islands. The mythology of the Selkie is often associated with mermaids; the Selkie as a shape-shifter, enchanting the sailor with song, two worlds colliding, the pull of the ocean, the fisherman and the seal. Through my writing I was able to explore my own deep connection to the sea. In my late twenties I went full time into music, it was a huge commitment but thankfully it has worked out. This is all I've ever wanted to do, and to be honest I've hardly ever looked at the trials and tribulations of making a living from music. I've found ways to make a living from music, whether that's gigging my own material or doing covers, whatever works I'm generally open to it."

His style is influenced by the Irish and Celtic folk music that he grew up listening to, the likes of Dick Gaughan, Kris Drever, and De Dannan with a special shout out to Johnny Ringo as bodhrán influencer and the open tunings of, John Doyle & Paul Brady on guitar and song writing, but he is a fan of many and varied musical genres. "I spend a lot of time these days listening to the music of A Blaze of Feather, & Ben Howard and also a lot of alternative folk and bluegrass music everything from Doc Watson, Tony Rice and the Old Crow Medicine show, to The Tallest Man On Earth, John Prine, Bob Dylan, Tracy Chapman and a lot of great music in between."

His own genre is alternate or indie folk roots music. Having played Festivals such as Glastonbury, Electric Picnic, Other Voices, All Together Now and 2000 Trees festival, he is taking to the road again with the new album *Way Out West* which launched in April. He now surrounds himself with a great scaffold, a superb team of professionals who clearly see his potential and are proud to support him. Among them are his label Cauldron Records, management team Darren Farrell and Eamonn De Barra, Bill Shanley on Bass, keys and guitar, who also produced the album, Seamie O'Dowd guest fiddle, Stephen O'Dowd, Mandolin Harmonica and backing vocals, Emma Gormley backing vocals, Aisling Bridgeman on violin and Laura Ryder on keys, and Martin Ditcham & Jonathon Owens on Drums. The album was mixed by Andrew Holdsworth and mastered by Denis Blackham with artwork by Mark Nally.



and on lunch breaks taught himself to play. He grew up in a house full of music, his mother Geraldine loved artists such as Dolores Keane, Patsy Cline and Nancy Griffith, whilst his dad was a big Creedence Clearwater Revival & Status Quo fan and loved all good rock 'n' roll music. His paternal grandfather Mick Gormley was a great flute player.

To pursue a degree in music Stephen moved to Dublin and found accommodation on Thomas Moore Road in Walkinstown, where his poetry and music continued in earnest. "It was serendipity really, living on that road, gazing on the moon at night, a very different land and streetscape from where I grew up. I sought out some of Moore's lyrics and enjoyed them, taking me back to my own writing, songs I had been working on before going to college and I've been composing ever since."

In terms of themes, the ocean, mythology, landscape, the seasons, all feature in his writing, his process finely tuned. "All of my songs come with the title first, for example, *Selkie*, from the new album. It came about when I was out on Coney Island with my partner Sarah, looking out on the harbour and reflecting on the link between Ireland, the

Chapter 37 : Seamus Egan. An appreciation by Mark Lysaght for Irish Music Magazine.

exposure to other cultures; it can absorb and adapt influences from foreign traditions, which enables it to advance and prosper on the world stage. A key element of this has been the intermingling of Irish people with the melting pot of nationalities in the United States, where emigrants and natives can blend their heritages with new and exciting influences.

Seamus Egan has been a highly influential figure in this regard, he was born in the USA in 1969 (providing him with automatic citizenship) but his parents returned home to Foxford, County Mayo when he was three. Back in Ireland, he took accordion lessons from Martin Donaghue, but the die was cast when he saw Matt Molloy performing with James Galway, alerting him to the range of possibilities available on wind instruments. His parents then relocated back to the USA, and he attained proficiency on a range of instruments (including flute, banjo, mandolin and whistles) in his early teens, by which time he had amassed an amazing four All-Ireland titles.

This brought him to the attention of those at the vanguard of the thriving Irish music scene in the USA, and he was soon performing regularly with the Green Fields of America under the tutelage of the late Mick Moloney. In 1985 he recorded a solo album called Traditional Music Of Ireland while still in his teens. Touring and collaborating with various musicians brought him in contact with other young players who were similarly anxious to test the

rish traditional music has benefited immeasurably from its established boundaries, and this led to the formation of the group Solas in 1996, releasing an eponymous debut album that year. The original band also included Winifred Horan on fiddle, guitarist John Doyle and singer Karan Casey, along with John Williams on accordion (who would leave the band after the second album Sunny Spells and Scattered Showers, to be replaced by Mick McAuley).

> While the band was grounded in Irish traditional music, Solas incorporated elements of country, rock and Americana, and included original compositions, which aimed to exceed or at least test many of the conventional boundaries established by the purists. The result was a heady and exciting hybrid, which caught the attention of a diverse audience, and established Solas at the forefront of a second wave of Irish groups. Various personnel changes occurred during the band's lifetime, with different singers featuring as time passed, with Seamus very much the driving force behind the group, and over a 20year period, Solas recorded a series of groundbreaking albums and cemented their reputation as true trailblazers for new Irish music.

> On a personal level, Seamus has been pushing boundaries from an early age, gaining initial respect as a prodigious multi-instrumentalist while still in his teens, recording solo projects for Shanachie Records, composing music for various films and documentaries including the award-winning film The Brothers McMullen, and progressing numerous parallel projects throughout his time with Solas. When the band effectively split up in 2017, he began touring as a solo artist. Free from the constraints of a group environment, he was able to explore a range of influences, and fuse ideas collected from collaborations with a diverse range of artists drawn from classical, jazz, rock and country music.

> The Seamus Egan Project consists of hand-picked performers, all with diverse backgrounds, who pool their collective resources to create original soundscapes and explore musical territory which may not always be clearly defined. Seamus regards his career as a series of experiences which have shaped his ability to absorb new ideas while remaining true to the strong traditions he was infused with as a young musician. He has noted the unique currency of Irish music

in creating a useful universal language which can be easily shared across genres (in a similar way that The Chieftains have collaborated throughout their career). Using the ideas from his 1996 solo outing When Juniper Sleeps as a basis for this exploration, he delights in the challenge of combining his accumulated musical identity with a range of outside influences.

At a relatively young age (he is still in his mid-50s), Seamus Egan has displayed the kind of effortless virtuosity that comes from a powerful artistic life-force from within, an innate musicality that allows him to perform, collaborate and create in any environment. As well, he has consistently shown courage and tenacity in pursuing his personal musical destiny. He continues to develop and explore innovative ideas, and will undoubtedly create more unique compositional offerings in the coming years.

oderich is nestled along the shores of Lake Huron, surrounded by the Irish and Scottish heritage reflected in nearby communities: Belfast, Dublin, Seaforth, Kincardine and Lucknow, two hours West of Toronto and almost three hours East of Detroit, MI.

For 32 years, world renowned musicians and music lovers alike have made the beautiful shores of Lake Huron an annual celebration of music, craft art, dance and culture of the seven Celtic Nations together

Canada is proud to have produced many artists who have appeared at the festival as well which include Heather Rankin, The McDades, Pierre Schrver, North Atlantic Drift, Shane Cook and the Woodchippers, Cassie and Maggie, The Fitzgeralds, Reynolds, Robinson & Lodge, Sean McCann, Irish Mythen, The East Pointers, Allison Lupton Band and so many more.

In 2023, we were blessed to have been able to bring in worldrenowned and platinum selling artist (Canada's own) Loreena McKennitt. What a very special treat it was to have Loreena go back to her Celtic roots and, along with Stratford, Ontario's Celtic group The Bookends, put on a magical performance.

One thing that does make our event unique is that our artists are housed in local homes during their stay in Goderich and many have made lifelong friends. There is no doubt why so many of our artists over the years keep requesting to come back and state that Goderich has become their home away from home. Irish legend Sean Keane said that "Coming to Goderich is my gift to myself".

We have an incredible Board of Directors who are involved not only as directors, but as volunteers on various committees during the festival itself. Our volunteer base is strong and committed to help produce the best event possible. Many have been with the Festival since day one and have brought their children and now grandchildren to get involved. Our "office" consists solely of our Artistic Director/General Manager of the Festival, Celtic College and Kids Camp. During the summer, we bring in at least one College student to work in helping put together the College and Kids Camp portions. As a Canadian Festival, we are fortunate to receive Government grants to ensure that this non-profit arts organization continues to thrive.

Our pattern is growth. As the oldest Celtic festival and the largest summer music school in North America, we constantly strive to expand. We started the Celtic Roots Festival then the Celtic College, the Celtic Kids Camp and the Rural Roots Concert Series. We established both the Tradition Bearer and the Young Tradition Awards, and

in the three-day Goderich Celtic Roots Festival. From a single memorial concert held in 1993, The Celtic Roots Festival has grown to include a weeklong Celtic College and Celtic Kids Camp with multiple additional activities throughout the week that also include nightly musical sessions. It is a truly immersive, enthralling experience both for performers and audience.

We are the oldest Pan Celtic Festival in North America. There are older specifically Irish or Scottish Festivals; but as far as we know, we were the first to focus on all seven Celtic Nations: Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Isle of Man, Cornwall, Brittany and Galicia.

The Goderich Celtic Roots Festival has been home to international artists such as Dougie MacLean, Hilary James & Simon Mayer, Altan,

produced a professional video series that has played on the Canadian Bravo and American PBS.

Inspired by our vibrant history, we want to broaden and deepen the cultural experience for our local attendees as well as our visitors from around the globe.



### THE COLLEGE EXPERIENCE

One of the largest Celtic Summer Schools has assembled an impressive line-up of tutors for 2024.



The Goderich Celtic Roots Festival had been running for just a few years when our founders, Warren and Eleanor Robinson, realized there was a need for a place where people could go and learn from the incredible Celtic musicians who would already be on site. It was then that the Celtic College was born. It started out small for the first few years and then Warren said, "Let's go big or go home!"

And so it grew ....and grew to be the largest one-week Celtic school in North America in terms of number of teachers. It now brings in approximately 200-250 attendees from across Ontario, Canada, the U.S and abroad with over 50 teachers.

Past instructors include: Kevin Burke, Liz Carroll, Liz Knowles, John Carty, Liz & Yvonne Kane, Máire Breatnach, Gerry O'Connor, Tom Morrow, Pierre Schryer, André Brunet, and Brian McNeil to name only a few.

The experience really is like no other. I will walk you through a typical day at The Celtic College.

We start off our day at 9am. There are 4 class periods on each day, Monday through Thursday. You can choose to attend all four classes or simply take 2 or 3 if you prefer.

For example, period one may be intro to DADGAD guitar and then second period will be Irish dance, third may be intermediate Scottish fiddle etc.. These will be the same classes with the same teacher each day and together you may learn technique on a particular instrument, perhaps a few tunes or some songs throughout the 4 days. The classes we offer are of course different from year to year and are dependent on which artists are attending the festival. There will always be many fiddle, whistle/flute, guitar, mandolin, harp, tenor banjo, bodhran, piano, singing/harmony, and dance classes to choose from. If music is not what you are looking for, we also have arts and craft classes such as felting, silver-smithing, mosaic craft work, embroidering, mandala, and more.

Once your college classes are done at 4:30, it is time for you to have dinner at one of Goderich's wonderful restaurants, after which you can stroll down to The Square (centre of town) and over to the bandshell.

This is where we present our "Teacher Concerts" each night, Monday through Thursday. This is a very special part of the Celtic College experience for our attendees, as this is where you get to see your teachers perform with their groups for a short set. It is free to the townspeople as well, which gives them a small taste of what they can expect at the festival on the weekend. Once that is over at 9:30, we start the Ceilidh dancing on The Square for one hour and this too is open to all with live musicians and a caller of course.

Our day is not done until we head over to The Park House restaurant where our hosts, Sherry, Herb and the entire staff welcome us for our evening sessions. Every corner is packed with groups of musicians which include pros and students alike. In the piano room, there may be a slower session, and upstairs is where we can find all our singers singing into the wee hours of the morning. Don't forget, 9am comes quickly and we must get to class on time!

Once the college got off the ground, the Robinsons were thinking about a place they might be able to send their own grandkids, and this is when The Celtic Kids Camp started to take shape. It is for young children ages 4-13 to experience arts, crafts, music and dance for a period of 5 days. They learn about Celtic Culture at a young age and how it fits into the community they live in. The Camp has produced several wonderful young adults who started at our Kids Camp and have gone on to have careers as full-time musicians as well as sound and lighting technicians. We are very proud of all our Celtic Kids.

Our College and Kids Camp week is not over until we all head

over to the festival grounds on Friday afternoon and present some of what we learned throughout the week up on the Dailey Stage and Kids Stage.

This is how we get the weekend that is The Goderich Celtic Roots Festival going.

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**MUSIC AND HEALING** Lisa Wong and the Bivalent Life of the Musician-Physician by Bruce S. Victor MD,

DLFAPA in Part 5 of our Series.



he reintegration of music and healing has meant battling one of the few, but truly annoying, downsides of the 'Enlightenment' and 'Age of Reason': to wit, that music, not borne of reason, should be dismissed as being irrelevant to cultural and social advancement, in general, and 'healing', in particular. Music was therefore sentenced to the category of 'entertainment' – at best, a nicety, at worst, a triviality.

However, we are becoming increasingly aware that, as Albert Einstein put it, the arts and sciences are "two branches of the same tree", because,

Manifesting her belief in the "strong concordance between musicians that heal and healers that play music," Lisa dedicated herself to its required pedagogy: she is both an Assistant Professor of Paediatrics and the Associate Director of Arts and Humanities Initiative at Harvard Medical School, but she also teaches a course on "The Role of Music in Health and Education" at Harvard College.

With the knowledge of the necessity of this advocacy beyond the ivy walls of Harvard, Lisa co-founded the Boston Arts Consortium for Health, and served on the Boards of Directors of the Massachusetts Cultural Council, the BPS Arts Initiative Advisory Council and Lesley University Institute for Arts and Health. She is currently chair of the education committee of the Conservatory Lab Charter School and works with the Massachusetts Cultural Council to establish Culture Rx, a 'social prescription program', which focuses on advancing the role of culture as a protective factor for the health of everyone in the Commonwealth.

Lisa joined the Longwood Symphony Orchestra as a violinist in 1984. This unique Boston-based orchestra is made up primarily of medical musicians dedicated to Healing the Community through Music. When she became president in 1991, Lisa helped shape its "Healing Art of Music" program, wherein each concert is designed to raise funds for, and public awareness of, community non-profit organisations that benefit the medically underserved. Over the years, LSO has collaborated with over 50 organisations, helping raise in aggregate over \$2 million. A memorable achievement...which you can read more about in a book she wrote assisted by writer Robert Viagas entitled *Scales to Scalpels: Doctors Who Practice the Healing Arts of Music and Medicine*.

By the way, I plagiarised the title of this article from a talk Lisa gave at Cambridge, called "Scales to Scalpels: Practising a Bivalent Life". I asked her whether she got this title from its definition in genetics: that "bivalent" refers to two attached chromosomes that carry the same genetic

as Dr. Theodor Billroth observed, 'imagination is the mother of both'. As both paediatrician and musician, Dr. Lisa M. Wong embodies the "bivalent" (her term) spirit of Drs. Einstein and Billroth; but as academician, author, and past President of a rather remarkable symphony orchestra, she has been compassionately relentless in her efforts to get Western culture to align with this spirit, particularly regarding the re-integration of music and healing.

And she will be coming to Rostrevor, Ireland in July, where she will be speaking and playing at the Fiddlers Green Festival. While classically trained, she told me that she was quite fond of Irish music and "could play D-drones with the best of them!"

Lisa grew up in Hawaii, the third of five children, all of whom played music together. She started to play the piano at age 3 and the violin at age 8, however, with her older siblings playing the violin and younger sister playing the cello, she also took up the viola. She quickly realised that the continuation of this idyll depended on their collective ability to transform the inevitable intrusive disharmonies, musically and socially (perhaps particularly when the youngest brother elected to play his trumpet amidst string quartets). While in high school, she began to use her musicianship in service, playing at children's hospitals and senior centres. When she entered college at Harvard, she was already interested in music therapy and music education, but ultimately chose to become a doctor, because that was "the best way to give equally of myself through music and through paediatrics". information...therefore serving the same function while housed in two separate entities. If so, what a marvellous metaphor!

Lisa replied: "in this post-Covid era, we know the effectiveness of the bivalent vaccine. I would argue that a bivalent life in music and healing could similarly immunise us from the diseases of loneliness and isolation."

Also a great metaphor and perhaps even more evocative of the true mission.

When the village of Sparta heard about the cancellation of the popular event, they checked with the Area Arts Council and the Rockford Chamber of Commerce and were told that if Sparta wanted to take it over, they were welcome to do so. In 2015, a non-profit organization was formed and "The Sparta Celtic Festival Inc." took over the operation of the festival from the Village of Sparta."

Gráinne: "Is there a big Irish and Scottish connection in Sparta?"

Dancers, and a children's playground. On Saturday, the festival's grounds double in size when neighbouring Balyeat Field hosts Highland Games. In addition to the continuing Music and Dance, there are also Children's Activities from noon until 5 pm on Saturday as well. The Cultural Societies and a few Scottish Clans have booths, and there are historical re-enactments, a living statue and even some workshop activities for people of all ages"

**Gráinne:** "Is it primarily local or are there travelling visitors to the weekend festival?"

**Bill:** "The majority of people are local, from the Grand Rapids and Muskegon areas. However, because of the Highland Games and Car Show on Saturday, along with the popularity of the regional music acts, more people travel from further away and have discovered that Sparta puts on a wonderful festival. Many of them return each year and bring their friends."

Gráinne: "Is the festival family-friendly?"

**Bill:** "Because of the beautiful park settings of The Sparta Celtic Festival, and because the festival remains free to enter, the event has boasted 'free, family friendly entertainment' since the beginning."

**Gráinne:** "Why is Celtic music so popular in a small area like yours?" **Bill:** "Michigan is lucky to have a vibrant Irish and Celtic Festival community. There are 10 Festivals in Michigan dedicated to the music genre and culture. Sparta, and the surrounding area has embraced this music as if it were its own. West Michigan in particular has many local bands and artists that are as good as any in the Midwest. The Sparta Celtic Festival has showcased those acts since it began."

**Bill:** "Not particularly in the village of Sparta, however it lies just a 10 minute drive north from Michigan's second largest city, Grand Rapids, which boasts a very active Scottish Society, a Gaelic League Irish-American Club, Michigan's oldest chartered Ancient Order of Hibernians and a Ladies A.O.H.. Several other Celtic based groups and associations also call the Grand Rapids Area "home". Sparta also draws from the large Irish community of Muskegon, just 30 minutes west and home of the very popular Michigan Irish Music Festival, held in September every year."

#### Gráinne: "What does the festival weekend entail?"

**Bill:** "As is the case with most music-based festivals, both Friday and Saturday feature Irish and Celtic based musical groups on a main stage, located in Rogers Park, in downtown Sparta. There is a Food Court, a Beverage Tent, Celtic vendors and craft booths, Irish and Scottish



#### Gráinne: "Why should people travel to Sparta this August?"

**Bill:** "The Sparta Celtic Festival continues to expand each year and has been built on the amazing performances of area musicians and dance companies. The event is widely supported by the local businesses and is run by a local board of directors with a fantastic group of volunteers. It is the state of Michigan's largest "Free Entry" Celtic Festival, but remains small enough to have a certain charm not easily duplicated in much larger festivals across the region."

### NIAGARA IRISH FESTIVAL ONTARIO, CANADA

Seán Laffey talks to Declan O'Sullivan about the second annual Niagara Irish Festival, which will be held on August 23 & 24, 2024.



eclan O'Sullivan is a naturally upbeat character, he greets me with a huge smile when we connect on zoom. His background image is of a glorious snow capped mountain, which I presumed was somewhere in the vast expanse of Canada. My first question is, where did you come from to get here?

Declan tells me he was born in Kildare, and first came to Canada to market Murphy's Stout, Heineken and the famous Canadian brew Molson. During this time he met his future wife and he says: "We went off on a big adventure. My wife took up a teaching job in Dubai and I sold container loads of booze to embassies all around the region. That adventure lasted 16 years. Whilst I was in Dubai I was performing in Irish bars as The Paddyman, singing a range of songs from traditional ballads to modern day classics. The performances went down well and I began touring all over the world. There was a large Irish ex-pat community there and I set up a session and folk scene centered on Fibber McGee's pub. I'm happy to say it still continues to this day. When upstate New York, both of which have established Irish festivals with over 10,000 people. Our inaugural event in 2023 was a huge success. It attracted 3000 music fans and we aim to double that number this year."

Declan tells us about the highlights of the 2024 Niagara Irish Festival: "Things really start on Thursday 22nd August when Niagara Falls will be lit up in the colours of the Irish flag. Following the fireworks display at 10pm we will sing the national anthems of Ireland and Canada. Friday night will have the theme "Irish music by candlelight in the park" and will be followed by an Irish ceili in the hall at 10.30pm. Saturday's theme is "Jump Around!" We have high energy Irish bands The Steel City Rovers and Grass Mud Horse, Bill Craig, Michael O'Grady Band and many more. This year we are also adding pony rides, the Niagara Police Pipe Band and a parade of the Irish county flags. There will be Irish food, artisan vendors, Irish dancing displays and more talented acts on our main stage, folk stage and kids area." Declan will close out the festival with his own The Paddyman & Friends show.

our first grandchild arrived, we decided we'd like to be near her, so we moved back here to the City of Niagara Falls." Declan is now the director of marketing for the city's flourishing tourist industry.

Whilst playing gigs under The Paddyman persona he met Paddy Treacy, a Galway native. They got talking about how they missed authentic music from home and agreed to try to do something about it in their new home. "We approached Doc Magilligan's pub and advertised an open Irish and Folk afternoon and were astonished when 40 musicians turned up. It's now a regular session, with our youngest player Sophia being just 14 and our oldest, the harmonica player, Joe who is 89. We run weekly sessions in the winter months and we switch to once a month during the summer, because people are off at festivals and we run outdoor events such as BBQ and patio sessions.

Declan and Paddy set up Irish Music Niagara as a non-profit organisation with the goal of "Sharing happiness through folk and Irish music. We are grateful for the support of the Ontario Cultural Attractions Fund (OCAF), local community volunteers & sponsors to make this happen." The Niagara Irish Festival comes under the IMN remit and Declan says he welcomes the financial help they have received from the Irish Emigrant Support Fund & City of Niagara Falls last year. They took advice from festivals across the border in the USA. "We are close to Lockport and about a 40-minute drive from Buffalo in Niagara Irish Festival is held outdoors at Firemen's Park, and Declan asks visitors to look out for the arrival of the festival Leprechaun by Niagara Helicopters on the Saturday. He adds: "Free parking is available, children under 12 are admitted free of charge and the weekend is family friendly and budget friendly. Gates open at 5.00 p.m. Friday and 10.30 a.m. on Saturday. Tickets and more information available from Eventbrite, our website and social media page below."

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### SOUTH SLIGO SUMMER SCHOOL JULY 14 – 20, 2024

Seána Haughey tells IMM's Seán Laffey that the great majority of the tutors at this year's South Sligo Summer School are steeped in the local and regional musical tradition of South Sligo and North Connacht.



any of them are former students, and that deep connection to the authentic local tradition is a major factor in attracting students to the Summer School.

I began by asking a simple question, how near are you to getting all the ducks in a row? "Things are coming together very nicely," she tells me in early May, adding that there is a wealth of local expertise to draw on, whether that be in the logistics of venue management or calling on a wide hinterland of accommodation providers. "Now in its 38th year, the South Sligo Summer School is a long-standing event in the cultural calendar of Tubbercurry and Co. Sligo."

Seána says that this longevity and the detailed care and attention which goes into providing a full and varied programme draws great numbers of musicians from Ireland and further afield. "It always follows the Willie Clancy Summer School in Clare and many musicians combine the two summer schools together. This year's Summer School improves their technique but helps them grow in confidence, not just as players but as people too. Our class sizes are kept at a manageable number to maximise the benefit for everyone."

Workshops are offered in Fiddle, Flute, Whistle, Button Accordion, Concertina, Uilleann Pipes, Harp, Banjo, Guitar, Bodhrán, Mixed Instruments for Adults, Singing & Lilting, Sean-Nós & Set Dancing. One lecture not to be missed is "Harmonious Traditions: Exploring Fiddle and Flute Duets in South Sligo & East Mayo" presented by John Wynne and John McEvoy on July 16th at 2:30pm in St. Brigid's Hall.

Advanced fiddler players can avail of Sligo Style Masterclasses with Oisin MacDiarmada and Manus McGuire. A full list of tutors is available on the website and with names like Seamie O'Dowd, Caitríona Ní Cheannabháin, Holly Geraghty, Deirdre Hurley, Leonard Barry, David Doocey and many more on the tutors roster, you can gauge the high quality of teaching available in Tubbercurry this July.

One name that looms large in the archives of the South Sligo Summer School is that of bodhrán and bones player Junior Davey. "We will be honouring Junior this year at our Monday Night Tribute Concert. Junior richly deserves this accolade. He will be around all week of course, playing and teaching and will present a special lecture on the role of bodhrán and bones in Traditional Irish music on Wednesday, 17th July."

I note that there will be a strong presence from the Leeds Irish community at this year's summer school. "Yes, there are strong historical and cultural connections between this area and Leeds," she tells me. "Many families left the area around our neighbouring village of Bonniconlon to make a new life for themselves in industrial Yorkshire, and the Leeds Irish Centre is one of the most active Irish

will be opened by renowned musician and Sligo native Manus McGuire on Sunday evening, July 14th."

Seána says that some of the participants registered to date this year are from places as divergent as Nova Scotia, Osaka Japan, Santa Rosa California & Frohburg in Germany, as well as places where there are large concentrations of Irish exiles like London and Leeds. She describes a typical day at the summer school. "Graded Workshops run for three hours each morning while the afternoons and evenings are packed with practice sessions, concerts, céilis, talks and more. By stratifying on the basis of ability, we believe that the students get the best from their week-long experience with us. They go away feeling they have learnt something useful, and attending the workshops not only

Seána reminds us that there is life beyond the music classes and the sessions in the town are legendary with players returning year after year for the craic, camaraderie and the magical experience of South Sligo music. All of which is made possible by a cohort of eager volunteers, financial assistance from the Arts Council of Ireland, Sligo County Council, MSLETB, Aurivo, Tubbercurry & District Credit Union Limited and the generous contributions and support of the local business community in Tubbercurry & South Sligo.

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### **MANDOLIN PROGRESSIONS** with Paddy Cummins

Play it!

he mandolin is a very old instrument, the origins of which go back to the lute of Medieval times. It is also fairly unique in the fact that it possesses four sets of double strings that give the instrument its rhythmic strumming patterns. Although there are three prominent types of mandolin available: the Neapolitan bowl-back, the arch-top and the flat-back, it is the flat-back mandolin that is most commonly used in the Irish tradition.

Paddy Cummins, the resident mandolin tutor for OAIM, teaches two courses: one for absolute beginners, while this progressions course is a follow-on course. In these two courses you will learn all there is to know about one of Ireland's most recognisable and traditional musical instruments from a teacher who is as relaxed as he is knowledgeable about the instrument.

Paddy was born and reared in Drimnagh, Dublin and began experimenting with music aged nine. His first instrument of choice was the mandolin, as played by his father; then the guitar, before eventually being saddled with a banjo aged fourteen. Paddy attended some brief

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tuition at Comhaltas branches in Monkstown but is largely self-taught and spent his teenage years completely dedicated to his music practice.

He holds a first class honours degree in Irish Music and Dance from the University of Limerick and was mentored there by John Carty. He also received masterclass tuition from established players such as Enda Scahill, Kieran Hanrahan, Cathal Hayden, Angelina Carberry and Brian McGrath.

In 2013 he founded a 7-piece traditional music group called Skipper's Alley and recorded an album with them which won the prestigious Loic Raison trophy at the Festival Interceltique de Lorient in France. Since then Skipper's Alley have featured on The Late Late Show, Ireland's flagship television show, as well as headlining gigs and festivals with other bands. Paddy still plays with Skipper's Alley and is also found gigging in Dublin's Temple Bar circuit, as well as being a much sought after private tutor.

#### The Course

In Mandolin Progressions, focus is placed on slightly more challenging techniques such as: triplets, hammer-on techniques, pull-offs, flicks, cuts, slides, variation and the use of moveable chords. Some tunes are taught in more challenging keys as mastering complex finger shapes will mould you into a more flexible musician.

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As a tutor, Paddy has a very laid back manner while his instruction is brilliantly clear. He shows both the proper and improper technique, which is very useful when guiding novice players. His relaxed style helps infuse the student of the mandolin with the correct attitude to learning, keeping tension at bay, and gently guiding the playing in a way that builds expertise gradually on a foundation of good technique and confidence.

So, if you haven't lifted the mandolin in a while and are feeling the pangs to get back into playing, let Paddy's contagious excitement about Irish music and the mandolin draw you back into a love affair with the instrument. And if you're just starting out with the mandolin, check out Mandolin Basics where Paddy will set you up with all you need to know to master the instrument in just 18 wonderful lessons.

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### **MAURICE O'KEEFE FESTIVAL Kiskeam and Ballydesmond**

March 30th Easter Weekend 2024. Seán Laffey reports for Irish Music Magazine.



he Maurice O'Keeffe Festival is shared between Kiskeam, Ballydesmond and Newmarket on the Cork side of the Sliabh Luachra triangle. My Saturday was spent between Kiskeam, which sits on high ground, and the valley that holds Ballydesmond; rolling hills connect the townlands and the distinctive sound of Sliabh Luachra music knots all these communities together.

I met festival organiser and box player Pat Fleming as the morning's set dance class drew to a close at the GAA sports hall in Ballydesmond. Before I could get my day into gear at Kiskeam, there next hour we walked and whistled our way through the three-part tune. As we reached the road beyond the river and looked back, there was a perfect rainbow dipping into Kiskeam, the foreground rushes of the hillside bathed in orange light, magical. On finishing the loop there was one more surprise. Anita had a bag of chime bars, we each got one. They made up sets of chords, so not only could we whistle the polka but we could accompany it too.

With a couple of hours before the evening concert I divided my time between an excellent singing session in the Shamrocks pub, with its dark front room and a blazing fire, so cosy. Then it was back to John D's pub in Ballydesmond to award myself a half hour indulgent listening to the early evening session with fiddler John Daly at its helm. The crowds hadn't arrived yet and the music was just sublime. The pub's wall displays dozens of black and white photographs of the greats of Sliabh Luachra music, a place of pilgrimage if ever there was one.

Kiskeam Community Hall was the setting for the evening concert, which doubled as a double CD launch. The night was emceed by Mary Conroy who put each musician at their ease and had great rapport with the hundred strong audience in the small hall. One of the standout performances for me was from the young Kiskeam Set dancers, parish boys and girls who showed a great love of the music and locality. The album launches, which made up the bulk of the evening, were very special. Valerie Casey gave us a simple performance of her new CD *In the Silence of the Twilight*, she must be one of the finest vocalists in the country and her delivery of songs from her album was top drawer.

was a photocall with a sculpture of a fiddler who is forever ready to play a slide or two.

Kiskeam's two pubs were buzzing hives of music on the Saturday afternoon (the festival held 27 sessions over the 4-day weekend). It was standing room only in The Why Not Bar, with every chance of getting a fiddle bow in your back as you waited for your beverage. I remarked to a fellow listener there was only one guitar and one bodhrán in the mix, this was a session where it was a badge of honour to know the local repertoire. A walk across to the Kiskeam Community Centre to catch the sound check of Timmy O'Connor, Pat Fleming and Steve Cooney. With the Australian guitarist giving an unplugged burst of his accompaniment genius. which left me spellbound.

The late afternoon was another treat, this time a whistling walk with Anita Bennis. Whistling in this case in the Lauren Bacall tradition, the pucker your lips and blow variety. A dozen or so of us tyro-siffleurs joined Anita on a loop walk of the Glouneen River. Gathering in a small clearing below the town within a ring of trees, on each tree a wren nestbox (this is Dreoilín country); Anita took out a camping kettle and demonstrated the physics of whistling. Then we democratically voted to learn the *Newmarket Polka* and for the Then came the launch of *Tunes From Tooureendarby* and it drew the biggest applause of the night, that was for octogenarian Timmy O'Connor. Introduced by a short interview by Mary Conroy, he was modest and self-effacing, yet when he began playing with Pat Fleming and Steve Cooney, the smile on Timmy's face brightened every corner of the room.

There's an untroubled happiness in the music of Sliabh Luachra and you get the real McCoy at the Maurice O'Keeffe Festival. I've marked the calendar for 2025, and I'm determined to take in the whole weekend next year.



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### MUIREANN NIC AMHLAOIBH AND DÓNAL O'CONNOR

Centre Culturel Irlandais, Paris, 24th March 2024. Michael Walsh reports.



66 Not all sean nós songs are about sad partings, unrequited love and loneliness." Muireann Nic Amhlaoibh teases while introducing *Nead na Lachan / Cuirimid Deandaí*, two children's songs that she's about to perform with her 'neighbour' Méabh ní Bheaglaoich who she's invited on stage. There follows a sean nós tour de force; the thrilling vocal dexterity of these two West Kerry singers expertly accompanied by the immaculate fiddle of Dónal O'Connor.

Muireann's captivating voice embodies the elemental splendour of her native Dún Chaoin. "I'm looking at putting some of Peig Sayers's stories to music. It always excites me to work with the intrinsic arrangements of trad classics. We've played together for many the year now and of course Dónal's mother Eithne was a massive influence on me."

The recent revival in sean nós singing is in no small part due to Muireann and her masterful collaboration with the Irish Chamber Orchestra in *Róisín Reimagined*, produced by Dónal. Singing sean nós is considered cool again and a new generation of listeners have been introduced to timeless songs. "It was probably the most important musical moment of my life and has given me the confidence to take risks to evolve and develop the tradition."

This is an evening of myriad musical highlights, skipping between exuberant tin whistle fuelled jigs, sprightly West Kerry Polkas and a luxuriant range of sean nós classics from the frivolous to the mournful.

The duo's tender treatment, on flute and fiddle, of *Lord Inchiquin*, O'Carolan's dignified slow air, resonates perfectly in the Baroque surroundings of La Chapelle.

Muireann gives a heartfelt rendition of *The Emigrants Farwell*, a sorrowful anthem of parting and lost love, set in the Vale of Avoca.

Dónal delves into the Lá Lugh back catalogue and reminisces about how uncool it felt at the time to perform with his parents. The duo's performance of *The Wedding* jig and *Aunt Lizzie's* is imbued with passion and exuberant delight.

The concert takes a turn towards the celtique diaspora with *El Garrotín*, the Asturian piping tune played in a flamenco style and made famous by Llan de Cubel; these two exceptional artists nimbly displaying their musical eloquence. Muireann majestically delivers *Bean Dubh A' Ghleanna*, a haunting sean nós tale of unrequited adoration.

A particularly poignant moment is when Muireann and Meabh sing *A Mháire Bhán Óg*, a song learnt from the late lamented Séamus, "the song is as gaeilge but Seamus insisted the chorus was Japanese ... air

musicality of the Irish language. Peig was from the same parish that I grew up in and I can empathise with what she told about her life. There's an intriguing juxtaposition of us both living in this area but how different our lives are."

Muireann and Dónal are performing in the historic Centre Cultural Irlandais as part of the Chapel Sessions. The concert opens with Muireann's aching rendition of the love song *Do Bhí Bean Uasal* with Dónal in support, deliciously painting musical patterns on the keyboards; the familiar melody of Carrickfergus entrancing the listeners. They remain captivated as she introduces *Port na bPúcaí*, a song from the Blasket islands about a fisherman enchanted one night by music calling on the sea wind; whale song or the voice of a woman captured by the fairies. Muireann's crystalline vocals entwining the delicate fiddle melodies.

The Paris concert is a brief respite for the duo from the intensity of performing with Orchestre National de Bretagne in *Irlande Classique, Éire Chlasaiceach* under the direction of Franco-Irish conductor Fiona Monbet. A series of concerts in Rennes, Lorient and Brest featuring compositions by Bill Whelan, Ina Boyle and a new commissioned work from Michael Gallen whom Muireann first met at a session in Dingle. "Michael sang one of his own compositions and it made a massive impression. I hugely admire and respect his work so when he invited me, I immediately accepted. The orchestral work is wonderfully challenging and massively fulfilling. Also performing as a duo with Dónal is great because there's so much musical space to explore new

The encores encapsulate the musical fluency of these emeritus performers. First Dónal's composition, *Gort na Glaise*, inspired by the legendary Táin; "a chirpy number, in praise of The Brown Bull of Cooley". Next Méabh joins the duo for the jaunty *Bó Na Leathadhairce*, "a primary school song taught to young children about the joys of making poitin".

The concert publicity had spoken of creating a moment of infinite poetry, a high bar indeed, but masterfully delivered on a night of exquisite vocals and compelling playing – pure joy.

#### RUM RAGGED

#### Gone Jiggin'

Our dear departed colleague Aidan O'Hara made a number of *Radharc* documentaries on the Irish of Newfoundland on RTE 1 in the 1980s. I'm sure he would have been delighted with *Gone Jiggin'* from Rum Ragged. Having seen the band play on numerous occasions at the Milwaukee Irish Fest, I know they are determined to tend to their living tradition.

Rum Ragged consists of Mark Manning (lead vocals, guitar), Aaron Collins (vocals, bouzouki, mandolin, tenor banjo, accordion, whistle, harmonica), Zack Nash (tenor banjo) and Cape Bretoner Colin Grant (fiddle, step dancing). The album was produced by Billy Sutton (who also plays with Irish based Miscellany of Folk). Billy contributes bass bodhrán, percussion and vocals.

The Road to Lushes Bight (Island Stock) is an homage to home, a commentary on the pulling power of Toronto, the inevitable doubts and ennui of comfortable middle age, where "all they've started ends" and the longing for roots "this place you are leaving is always your home".

Collins plays box on *Ray Head's, Harry Eveleigh's and Mrs Belles.*. the first a slow tune, the latter two are Newfoundland singles, similar to a Kerry slide. Each name in the selection referring to tradition bearers from whom the band learned the melodies. Comical songs are popular in Newfoundland and the album includes: *Kelly and the Ghost, Thomas Trim, and Riley.* The habitual drunk Kelly is scared into sobriety by meeting a spirit on the way home; I won't spoil the twist in the tale, it's there where the comedy lies.

The Dewy Dells of Yarrow is a standout ballad from Manning. And for rarity, the traditional song Paddy Hyde has its first recording and what a good job Rum Ragged do with it. There's an unknown Irish provenance on The Green Shores Of Fogo which was first collected in 1952 by Kenneth Peacock from a Mrs John Fogarty.

Box and banjo are to the fore on the *Viking Jig* and this smoothly transitions to *West Bay Centre* as Colin Grant joins the fun. Hailed by many as the finest band to come out of Newfoundland in a generation, *Gone Jiggin'* is an album for the ages. Highly recommended.

#### The Magic Roundabout

Raj Records RAJCD 006, 8 Tracks, 40 Minutes https://sessiona9.bandcamp.com Loved for their mischievous humour as well as their high-quality music, this magnificent seven-piece has been among the most popular bands on the Scottish folk scene for quite some time. Each member is a star in their own right: drummer Dave "Chimp" Robertson, pianist Brian "Beard" McAlpine, singer and guitarist Marc "Colonial" Clement, and fine fiddlers four. Adam Sutherland from Inverness, Gordon Gunn from Wick, Kevin Henderson from Shetland and Charlie Mckerron from Speyside play the fiddle pieces which are the hallmark of Session A9, mostly their own compositions here. Although this is a studio recording, that humour is evident from the album title to the final frantic reel *Eroticon VI* - named for a conference which Adam attended, I think!

The Magic Roundabout opens with a punchy Sutherland strathspey introduced in cinematic style with ominous pounding chords, and quickly moves into a pair of delightful reels by Gunn and Mckerron. Waltzes from McAlpine and Mckerron provide a sweet contrast, artfully arranged to make the most of the band's prodigious musicianship. *Friday the 13th* is a contemporary slow air with no filmic references, cool jazz and carefully jarring cadences behind some superb fiddling. Billy Peace's joyous Orkney saunter Rachel's Graduation Day has a touch of that American swing which spices so much Northern Isles music. Speaking of Americana, the other two slower tracks here are songs with a transatlantic pedigree: Tom Waits' *Heart* of Saturday Night and Robbie Robertson's *Twilight* which predates the movie by a few years. Both vocal numbers are backed with all the verve of Vegas or Nashville, lush without turning syrupy.

After some very precise driving on the title track, our heroes close this classy CD on a selection of happy tunes: a jaunty fling and two lively reels, no sharp objects, just smooth bowing and solid accompaniment.

#### MOON LOOKS ON Way Out West

#### Baroda Music, 11 Tracks, 42 Minutes www.moonlookson.com

Stephen Gormley, aka 'Moon Looks On', has released Way Out West, a much anticipated album of original compositions, themes that tackle ordinary human conundrums, celebrates the natural world and explores relationship dynamics with maturity. He is an articulate lyricist, drenched in the wonders of the natural world, well connected to our mountains, land, rivers and island seascapes.

Genre-defying, he is a fine singer, versatile, emotional with great range. The title track *Way Out West* celebrates his youth, a man who was "born to roam and born to ramble", rhyming couplets to a catchy melody, "love is always such a gamble", (is there a west of Ireland hint of Saw Doctors in it?).

A relationship explored in a song inspired by the ocean, ancient mythology, the fish-creature, temptress turned woman in *Selkie*, in first person, the writer falls under the spell of a girl, like the pull of the ocean, "she carried me home", great pace in *Cabin Fever*, a swing, a fling, a gin with Rosie, storytelling to music. *The Mist from the Mountain* takes him back to the Ox mountains where life began, and like Seamus Heaney who called his place of origin 'a cherished territory', Stephen Gormley's Sligo is just that.

*Raising the Roof* is a standout, a song of loss, memories, "of youth come alive dancing in the early morning sun", best to "raise a glass to those who've gone their way", celestial references, spirit soaring, clouds parting, tenderness; "I hear you sometimes whistling in the breeze", and the listener is treated to a blast of whistling, most unusual, charming.

With a host of musical luminaries as guests, the album is on the Baroda Music label, recorded and produced by Bill Shanley, also featuring Stephen O'Dowd, Aisling Bridgeman, Seamie O'Dowd and Emma Gormley among others, an excellent piece of work.

#### WOLF LOESCHER Immigrant Songs Off Hand Productions, 12 Tracks, 54 Minutes wololoco.com

Wolf Loescher is a singer/storyteller based in Longmont, Colorado, who has had a long association with the Celtic scene in Texas and will tour Ireland with the Piper Jones band in summer 2024. Wolf sings songs and tells stories from the Old World and the New, accompanying himself on his custom Irish bouzouki, tenor guitar, bodhran, and foot percussion.

A highland pipe lament opens the album on Runrig's *A Dance Called America*, a song about the enlightenment's capitalist ideals and the colonization of Anglophone America, and how that idea still fuels the draw of the USA for the poor, disposed and ambitious. He invests Robert Earl Keen's *Mariano* with a staccato beat, with Mari Black's fiddle playing knitting the track together as the song tells of an immigrant who works illegally in the southern USA. He takes us into Irish Celtic rock on The Elders' *American Wake*, a song that deserves a wide appreciation and would work in a number of acoustic contexts.

Steve Earle's *City of Immigrants*, it is a multicultural urban experience with a bravado intro from Tim Britton's uilleann pipes playing a zydeco riff, upbeat and strident, the drums and bass creating a place for Frances Cunningham's harmony vocals. More uilleann pipes and some gorgeous guitar playing from Scooter Muse on Brendan Graham's *Isle of Hope*. Wolf's voice here is at its most emotional and fragile on the album. More strings on Pat Byrne's *The Hills of Killedmond*, a look back at the home an immigrant has left in Ireland; the language here locates the story in the recent present and yet it is a timeless reminder that nearly every family in Ireland will have an exiled daughter and son in their family tree. Economics and opportunity push emigrants into immigrants and there is no more explosive propellant than discovery of gold by John Sutter which resulted in the Californian Gold Rush which Wolf sings about on Dan Fogelberg's *Sutter's Mill*.

The final track is Loescher's version of Willie Nelson's *Living in the Promiseland*, with its initial verse:

Give us your tired and weak, And we will make them strong Bring us your foreign songs, And we will sing along

Running parallel to the main song is *This Land Is Your Land* written in 1940 by Woody Guthrie. In these times of isolationism and border walls, *Immigrant Songs* reminds us of the power of an idea to make the best of us and of all new worlds.

#### PETE MORTON Fair Freedom

Wordsmiths come in a variety of flavours, some are verbose, others doodle in the verbal margins of meanness. Peter Morton's writing is literate, liberal, and often funny, he obviously delights in the cadence of syllable and the allure of alliteration. The opening track, *The Rivers of the Isle* would test any O-Level geography student in the UK, its rivulets of rhyme here as deft as the Derwent, the Dee and the Don. Things get a lot more environmentally serious on *Newton's Parakeet*, the extinction of keystone fauna is a warning of our own species' vulnerability:

And the weeds would fill the street,

When we fell in our defeat,

Non existent, not a tweet!

Like Newton's Parakeet.

The Ghost of a Sailor, is the longest track at 7 minutes, delivered in talking blues style. He imagines a friendly ghost in your local pub. The apparition can be seen when the filter of modern life is lifted by a surfeit of drink. The ghost reflects, cogitates and considers the hundreds of years of history that have played out in the bar. The monologue is interspersed with verses of songs such as Adieu Sweet Lovely Nancy, All for Me Grog and My Bonnie Lies Over The Ocean, each plucked from the ages the spirit has witnessed passing before him.

He considers the current situation in Gaza in his song *Sharing The Land*, a call for a peaceful two State solution, which seems so difficult from this current point in history. He offers us advice against the tribulations and trolls of spending too much time on social media in *The Genuine You:* 

Don't let this modern life break your heart

You've been perfect here from the start,

Away from the likes, the dislikes, the pressure and fear.

This world's got bullies who can be so cruel,

Technology can take us all for fools

Pete Morton frequently takes on the jester's motley and tells truth to power. Check out *Fair Freedom* on Bandcamp and discover the potential of his lyrics for yourself.

#### As the Trees Have Always Known

Yeats found inspiration in the woods at Coole Park, where he saw "an entrance to another world", similarly the Australian singersongwriter Melanie Horsnell draws deep inspiration from trees. From her forthcoming album *Gold and Carnelian*, she has released a single, *As the Trees Have Always Known*, composed while touring Northern NSW, a reflective time as evidenced in the melody. On route to Dorrigo, she watched the trees "leaning into each other", mutually supportive.

Rich in poetry, the voice ethereal, in meditative mood, the trees are being carefully observed, as if in a trance, the writer engrossed with nature, watching the limbs reach up, their "heads touch the sky", during "the season of growing", she asks, "can we live this life together", as vegetation flourishes in the wilds of the Australian bush. "Take me down to the river, come and watch the water flow", a sweet, repeated refrain.

There's great synergy between the voice and instrumentation, accompaniment feels natural, organic, ebbing and flowing like the river, with Colm Mac Con Iomaire on fiddle, Jonathan Zwartz on double bass, Bill Risby on piano and Hamish Stuart on drums, a tasty sample of what's to come in the album.

#### CLARE CUNNINGHAM On My Way/Ar Mo Bhealach

Own Label, 18 Tracks, 70 Minutes www.clarecunninghammusic.com Living in Nashville, staying close to her Irish roots in her recent album On My Way/Ar Mo Bhealach, Clare Cunningham has already



established herself with a solid reputation as a fine vocalist and songwriter. An outspoken, empathetic, advocate for mental health, she has worked with Garth Brooks, Steve Earle and Vince Gill among others. This album, with twenty-three guest musicians is a prayerful tribute to Ireland, a repository of love-filled memories and an emigrant lament.

*Irish Dad* written with Steve Dean and Bill Whyte is a tribute to her own father, "my dear old Irish dad", his devotion to the Irish parenting cliche, lines taken from *An Irish Blessing*, dovetailed with older generation wisdom, "money comes and money goes", a father's blessing for his daughter. *Until We Meet Again* is a tender love song, for the one love, the only love, perhaps the distant love, the writer vowing to "sing through all the bad", until they are reunited. *Gather All Ye Rosebuds* has a hint of Nashville, a strong country vibe, written with Wood Newton, the message is to Carpe the life out of the diem!

Reminiscent of *A Stór mo Chroí,* there's a trilogy of tributes to Ireland, *Eireann i mo chroí,* like all poignant emigrant songs, a celebration of the birthplace and homeland, the longing for home, "when I dream I dream about the days gone by", sad but warm, lovely. Paired with *Dear Ireland*, epistolary, a letter to home, "if I could take you here with me", an evocation to always remember her as the exile, also *Home Again,* in homage, the poet counting down the days until the next visit, "tell her I'm on my way", the last line, fittingly in our native tongue, "tá mé ar mo bhealach", tuning in with the title.

#### **RICHARD TRETHEWEY**

Two Halves

#### Own Label, 10 Tracks, 46 Minutes www.richardtrethewey.org

A native of Cornwall, Richard Trethewey is a singer, cittern and fiddle player who has a deep understanding of the region's folk tradition, and he has devoted a lot of energy to researching the local history, presenting music with his own individual interpretation of various events, contemporary in feel while deeply respectful to the area's rich heritage. As well as his solo work, he is a member of several groups and ensembles as well as working as a music therapist. On this album he is joined by some exceptionally talented musicians, including Freya Jonas on piano and Neal Jolly on double bass, as well as using niche instrumentation such as a wonderful brass quartet on *The Sounds Of The Mine*.

The album, as its title suggests, consists of two sets of five tracks; the first five are inspired by stories associated with Cornish rivers, the remainder focus on Cornwall's industrial history. All music is composed and arranged by Richard, and he displays a wonderful sense of harmony and dynamics while retelling the various stories he is so familiar with. The ensemble playing is very special and all participants are clearly deeply invested in the various themes.

He has a relaxed and pleasant vocal style, so the songs flow very naturally. *Queen Of The Cornish Rhine* has a nice medieval feel, while *The Lonesome Track* has a nice insistent rhythm. The second half includes material specifically associated with mining, *Trethewey Mine* relates a true story of members of Richard's family who emigrated to Canada seeking their fortune in the 19th century. There are also two excellent instrumental pieces - *Ruan Lanihorne Castle* builds slowly from a solo harp before developing with beautiful harmonies.

Overall, this is a fine album from an artist who is obviously deeply committed to his work.

#### MOJNA

#### Väntenätter

I'm reviewing this album in the week after the controversial 2024 Eurovision Song Contest, which was held in Malmö, Sweden. This album is the best antidote for the over produced glam pop pantomime we often associate with that competition.

Thomas Eriksson (composer / guitars), Helga Myhr (Hardanger fiddle) and Anna Malmström (clarinet / bass clarinet) are MOJNA, a Swedish/Norwegian trio playing newly composed, Nordic folk music on guitar, Hardanger fiddle and clarinet/bass clarinet. Their debut album *För Sola Skin' På Tak* (2022) was nominated for both Manifestgalan (2023) After the first year of their nationwide live tour, Onóir have just launched their self-titled debut album. 2024 sees the Donegal-based vocal quartet heading out on a month-long tour of The United States before performing in The UK & Scotland this coming Autumn.

and Folk & Världsmusikgalan (2023). MOJNA's music has credence and credibility within the cognoscenti.

Thomas Eriksson is a Swedish guitarist, cittern player and composer who works mainly with traditional and contemporary Nordic folk music. He is currently living in Oslo, Norway. The music on *Väntenätter* has a tendency to be glowering. and deliciously so; MOJNA's darkness has a charm all of its own. The trio performs newly composed, inventive Nordic folk. The clarinet in particular brings out this music's sombre qualities in tracks such as: *Väv*, especially the first half before the Hardanger fiddle which is in the same tonal range, joins in, adding subtle trills and tremolo. *Spegling* is a minimalist four minutes of breathy flute and resonant clarinet coupled with an atmospheric guitar and a gentle hum of a breeze. *Svirra* is a dance tune which makes the most of the drone DNA of the Hardanger, the music working round and round; there's a break in the fiddle melody as the guitar briefly takes up the main tune.

The title track *Väntenätter*, which Google translates as 'Wait Tonight' does indeed take a long time to build into its circular crescendo, this pattern of a considered beginning is a hallmark of Eriksson's composing talent.

Irish listeners will have no problem with the material here as this ground has been harrowed by Altan's Mairéad Ní Mhaonaigh with her adoption of the Hardanger fiddle into Irish traditional music. MOJNA's *Väntenätter* will bring you into a mystical world of new Nordic music, this is one for the musically adventurous.

#### MICHELL, PFEIFFER & KULESH Flowers

#### Ditto Music, 10 Tracks, 37 Minutes www.odettemichell.com/mpk

A trio of ladies who sing in close harmony, Odette Michell, Karen Pfeiffer and Daria Kulesh. They are also multi-instrumentalists, playing bouzouki, guitar, accordion, bodhrán, shruti box, percussion and woodwind (Irish flute and recorders). Produced, mixed and mastered by



Jason Emberton, the album features the impressive instrumental talents of Jason Emberton (drums, strings, keyboards), Katrina Davies (violin), Phil Beer (violin on *The Cossack's Bride*), Jonny Dyer (guitar on *May Colven*) and Marina Osman (piano on *Those Were the Days*).

The title track *Flowers* is about sisters who each say, "in the bracken, I met a strange man, a lust in his heart, and a knife in his hand". This is a murder ballad, but it is the three sisters who do the deadly deed!

Other songs include *My Love's in Germany* and Pete Seeger's *Where Have All the Flowers Gone*?, the melody was from a Ukrainian folk song. It came to Seeger by way of a melody from an Irish lumberjack song, "Johnson says he'll load more hay."

The unique musical dimension that Michell, Pfeiffer & Kulesh bring to this art form is their ability to sing international songs in European languages. For example *Those Were The Days My Friend*, that Mary Hopkins classic takes on a whole new suit of clothes when sung in German. Similarly *The Cossack's Bride*, which was the trio's debut single is set to the familiar tune that Dion O'Brien used for the Seekers' *The Carnival is Over*. It began life as a Russian Folk song, which you may know as *Stenka Razin*. Michell, Pfeiffer & Kulesh help us discover, it's a dreadful tale of a Persian princess being thrown off a boat in the Volga River in a moment of drunken macho chest beating by the Cossack leader Stepan "Stenka" Razin. An event that may have actually taken place.

Another real event was the creation of the song *Peatbog Soldiers*, which was written in a German political prisoners' concentration camp in 1933. It is without doubt the most well known folk song in Europe and their version is a chilling juxtaposition of despair and hope. Passion and poignancy mark this as a debut album that is surely a

curtain raiser for a long career ahead.

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
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### THE MIST FROM THE MOUNTAIN
