

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

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DON "BANJO" SMITH www.donbanjosmith.com

In the spring of 2016, Don "Banjo" Smith set out to make a follow up album to *The Rose Sessions* that he and Marty "Moonshine" McKernan released the year before, not necessarily of the same vein, but of the same quality. In order to achieve that goal, he again recruited Marty as his Co-Producer/multi-instrumentalist, and song contributor, and Bob Both (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Bob_Both), of Twain Recording Studio in New Jersey, as Recording Engineer and Co-Producer.

The album is/was to be a Concept Album, similar to the one Earl Scruggs did in the early 70's (Earl Scruggs with Family and Friends), whereas Don would be featuring many of the very talented people he has performed with over the years. This has proven to be quite an undertaking with so far up to 14 different musicians, and several have been lost over this time, before they could be brought to the studio to record for this album. There are one or two more Don would have liked to have brought in, but you can't have everything.....

Don features the likes of frequent collaborator Marty McKernan, Jack Driscoll, Mike Griffin, Randy Shenise, Greg Jowaisas, Terry Kane, Jeanie Cassels, et al, playing a variety of instruments on a variety of songs, many of them Irish in origin, but also some original songs (all really good!) by Marty, Randy, Jeanie, and Greg, and a few by some well-known songwriters. It was slated to be finished in early winter 2019, but a break was taken in late Feb. to start playing during the busy season, and then Covid struck, and everything came to a grinding halt.

We got back to work in the autumn of 2020, and all the mixing and overdubbing was finished by summer of 2021, and just recently the artwork was attended to, and we launched the new album just before Saint Patrick's Day, 2025.

I believe that the results will have been worth the wait!








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

Based in England, MIKAM was started by Mick O'Gorman and Muz (Keith Alexander Murrell) with the equipment from the retired Jonathan Kelly Band. Parting ways in 1980 the sound equipment moved to Ireland, first large client being a sell-out Bagatelle Tour (we sadly remember Andy Walton who died in a crash returning from a show). Settling in, the company diversified taking in music shows, Product Launches and work with RTE particularly the 7Up Beats on the Street. Providing audio enhancement for the 250th Anniversary of Handel's Messiah in Dublin and travelling sound for Expo 92 in Seville was the gateway to delivering Live Sound to RTE TV for the 3 consecutive Eurovision Contests hosted by Ireland. From that has come a 30 year relationship with Riverdance the Show.

The current client list includes The Abbey Theatre, The Gaiety Theatre, The CCD, RTE RADIO, Murt Whelan Sound, Acoustik Productions, Session Hire, Red House, Magic Kite, NIAVAC, The Dublin Theatre Festival and many more, thank you. Hailing from County Clare, Fiona Tyndall has been immersed in Irish and Celtic music traditions since childhood. 





There are albums that flatter the listener's ear. Then there are albums that wake it up, pour cold water over its head, and whisper something half-mad in its sleep. The Dark Well is one of the latter.

Enda Scahill, founder of We Banjo 3 and long recognised as one of Irish music's great banjo innovators, teams up with Joel Andersson, the Swedish mad scientist of harmonica making, to produce something far stranger — and more beautiful — than a collection of tunes has any right to be.

This isn't your grandfather's trad album. Tunes are stripped back to the bone, turned sideways, and occasionally dismantled entirely — only to be rebuilt with a kind of gleeful menace. Nothing is safe: not the rhythms, not the harmonies, and certainly not your expectations.

"We weren't trying to be clever," says Scahill. "We were trying to be different — and then it got out of hand."

As if the core duo weren't enough, The Dark Well is scandalously adorned with guests so outrageously talented and far-flung, both geographically and stylistically, that the liner notes may require a passport and a stiff drink.

There is precision here, yes — but also a touch of chaos. A gleam in the eye. The feeling that something might fall apart at any second, or suddenly reveal its other face.

The Dark Well might just delight the listeners who've been secretly waiting for trad to misbehave a little.

him, and several of the tracks are tunes she remembers being taught as a child, capturing the essence of a tradition passed lovingly from one generation to the next.

The album's cover photography is rooted in the very landscape the music was born from - the Caves of Kiltanon themselves - further anchoring the record in the place and spirit that inspired it.

While firmly grounded in tradition, the album also makes space for deeply personal touches. Among these is *"The Wedding"*, a beautiful composition by Phil Cunningham that the couple played on their own wedding day.

Francis Cunningham is a strong, rhythmical concertina player and a fresh name on the Clare concertina scene, bringing a dynamic pulse and expressive character to the music. His playing blends seamlessly with Eimear's fiddle and harp, and together their duet style is marked by subtlety, elegance, and emotional depth.

With extensive touring experience across the U.S., Europe, and Australia, Francis and Eimear have earned a reputation for their thoughtful, masterful musicianship. *The Caves of Kiltanon* is a living document of their shared musical heritage. 40 minutes of carefully chosen tunes, tender interpretations, and a sound that is both timeless and uniquely their own.

Since 2018, City of Dublin FET College, Southwest Campus, Ballyfermot has, in partnership with Na Piobairí Uilleann, been offering an instrument making strand to students. The instrument making strand is part of the college's Higher National Diploma/ Traineeship in Irish Traditional Music Performance and Instrument Repair and Maintenance (Ceoltóir) programme, and graduates of the course may progress to the college's BA (Hons) in Media Production Management which is validated by Dublin City University.

This course, while retaining its academic qualifications, has now become a traineeship and brings a new level of funding and work placement opportunities for Irish Traditional Musicians and instrument makers.

The traineeship enables students to deepen their understanding of Irish Traditional music, develop as performers, learn the craft of instrument making from expert makers, and equips students with the skills and qualifications to progress to a sustainable and rewarding career in music.

There is also an opportunity for instrument makers to offer fully insured work placement to students on this course. All instrument making training is delivered by Na Piobairí Uilleann in NPU's Pipecraft training facility.

The Traineeship is free to access and open to potential participants of all ages and backgrounds including school leavers, older learners, and those in, or seeking employment.

For those currently unemployed or on a state funded allowance a training allowance or income support is available.

This album presents a collaboration between the German musician and radio presenter Harald Juengst and his Irish friend, the Tyrone man Eamon McElholm of Solas and Stockton's Wing fame.

The friendship between Harald and Eamon started about 30 years ago over in Germany. In those days the highly skilled Tyrone man was part of a high profile "Irish Folk Festival Tour" as a guitarist and singer. Harald's radio station *WDR Cologne* recorded the show which he later presented on air to a huge audience including an interview with Eamon.

On this production, Harald plays a C-sharp minor stainless steel handpan with 9 strongly reverberant tone fields, manufactured by Bill Brown. With its 432 hertz frequency, this particular handpan carries mellow, earthy, relaxing sounds to the heart and ears which long to caress the soul- an overwhelming sound escaping from time and space to soothe, calm and comfort.


To complement the sound Harald plays a KoMo, a combined instrument consisting of a 13-string in C-sharp minor pentatonic tuned Koto as well as a monochord with 25 strings, all tuned in C-sharp.

Eamon contributes piano, guitar, keyboard, programming and his enormous creative and magical professional empathy for arrangements, sounds, engineering, and producing.

There are 10 tracks on this album, all composed in teamwork by Harald Juengst and Eamon McElholm. The production was recorded at Eamon's Homeboy Studio, Omagh, County Tyrone, Ireland and was mastered by Pete Maher, Top Floor Productions, London. The playing time is 58 minutes.

CRUISING WITH JOANIE

Aboard the high seas with Joanie Madden and her Folk 'n' Irish family of music lovers, writes Seán Laffey.



ecently, I caught up with award-winning flutist and music dynamo Joanie Madden in Miltown Malbay, County Clare. She just finished a sold-out musical bus tour of Ireland and she was still glowing from the experience. "We had a brilliant trip," Joanie grinned, "and to top it off, when I got home, a gang of the best musicians on the planet surprised me with a 60th birthday party where the music didn't stop until 6:30 in the morning!"

Long nights of tunes are nothing new for Joanie. As the founder and driving force behind the internationally acclaimed group Cherish the Ladies, she's built a career performing with unmatched passion. But in recent years, Joanie has taken her love of Irish music beyond the stage—and onto the sea.

Her Folk 'n' Irish Cruises have become legendary: part music festival, part cultural retreat, and part floating family reunion. "We create a week where everyone, performers and guests alike, are immersed in Irish music, dancing, culture, and craic," she says.

Her next voyage? This August, a nearly sold-out Danube River cruise from Budapest to Passau in Europe. "The boat holds 167 people, and we're bringing 14 top-tier traditional musicians with us and it's going to be a blast!"

Joanie's inspiration for these cruises began years ago when she performed on numerous Clancy Brothers cruises. "I saw the magic of it, the way it spoke to people who were deeply passionate about Irish music," she recalls. It wasn't long before she began organising her own, putting her signature stamp on every detail. She partners with Norwegian Cruise Line, and her flagship event, the Joanie Madden's Folk 'n' Irish Cruise, now

draws over a thousand guests from around the world each year. "We usually depart from Florida, but this time, we're sailing from New Orleans: January 25 to February 1, 2026," she says.

This voyage is already shaping up to be one for the books. "We've got over 85 musicians, singers and dancers booked so far," Joanie says. "And we're thrilled to be joined by a film crew from TG4, who will be documenting the entire journey for a feature programme."

So, who joins a Joanie Madden cruise? "Everyone, from teenagers to retirees," she says. "We have guests from all over the world and what brings them together is their love for traditional music, joining in the sessions, lectures, set dancing, waltzing, jiving, sing-a-longs, and the craic! People bond, share stories, and leave with new friendships, with many coming back year after year."

Joanie ensures there's a rich tapestry of entertainment. Each performer is scheduled for just 90 minutes a day, whether it's a concert, workshop, or class, leaving them ample time for informal sessions and spontaneous fun. "We want our musicians to be part of the experience, not just performers," she explains. "And many of our guests are not just spectators, they're session players, singers, dancers, who all help to make the magic happen."

And what a lineup it is. The 2026 cruise includes performances from Cherish the Ladies, Lúnasa, Dervish, Derek Warfield & The Young Wolfe Tones, Don Stiffe, Matt Molloy, Kevin Burke & John Carty, Ger O'Donnell & Trevor

Sexton, George Murphy, Rory Makem, The Kane Sisters, Swallows Tail Ceili Band, Donal Murphy, Patrick O'Sullivan, Kathy Durkin and many more.

Pulling off a music cruise of this scale is no easy feat, but Joanie runs a tight ship. "We bring our own gear and a dedicated crew of sound engineers. In November, we will do a test run on the Norwegian Escape to plan every logistical detail: where the concerts and sessions happen and how to optimise the flow of each event. One thing I love about Norwegian is their casual dining policy," she says. "No assigned tables, no set meal times and a casual dress code."

Joanie's Folk 'n' Irish Cruise with seven months to go, is already more than 60% booked. Prices start at \$1,500 per person, which includes accommodations, meals, drinks, gratuities, Wi-Fi and access to all performances and events.

"It really is a big floating family festival," Joanie smiles. "There's nothing like the feeling on board; music, dancing and craic around every corner, new friendships, incredible scenery, and the deep joy of sharing our traditions. I absolutely love it."

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SHERIDAN RÚITÍN'S FREAKSHOW

Rooted in traditional Irish balladry but laced with the raw folk energy of American back porch storytelling, New York's Sheridan Rúitín has moved on considerably from their Pub roots, writes John O'Regan.



his year Sheridan Rúitín played festivals, pubs, and concert venues during a sold-out February-March "St. Patrick's Tour" from the Catskills to Virginia, and even a few wild nights in Boston and the rest of New England. Their show at The Black Rose was a highlight; they played Rattlin' Bog and a guy in the front dressed in a full feathered chicken costume jumped on stage - he got booed and thrown off!

The band formed in the Spring of 2020 in Congers, New York, starting in "Sheridan's Pub". Actually a detached garage, converted DIY style, which came into its own at the beginning of the Covid 19 pandemic, as more pubs and restaurants were shutting their doors. Band founder Billy Houlihan became a regular at his next door neighbour's pub. "Sheridan's pub was complete with a speaker system, Guinness on tap (ran through G-mix), and portraits of the 1916 Rising Irish rebel leaders." Since then the band has developed through two albums, a live demo set and Rebels in the Night and now their new album

Freakshow captures the dual spirit of heritage and reinvention. Whether it's the foot-stomping energy of Sean McCarthy's classic ballad Red-Haired Mary, or the aching lament of the original North Georgia Mountains, every track hums with the pulse of memory and resilience. At its core, Freakshow is a love letter to songs traditional and original, and the stubborn beauty of keeping one's roots alive while experimentally bending folk as we know it. It's music for the wanderer, the nostalgic, and anyone who's ever felt the pull of adventure.

Billy opens up about the album. "Freakshow, is the most daring thing we've done yet. We've always rooted ourselves in Celtic folk, but we are bending the genre into new territory, mixing it with pop-rock, cinematic storytelling, and a kind of theatrical grit we call Celtwave. It's a celebration of outsiders, misfits, and wild nights, stitched together with fiddles, electric guitars, and a few different types of bagpipes.

"Freakshow has twelve tracks, nine originals and three traditional tunes we've Sheridanized into our own. Originals like North Georgia Mountains, Bad Habit, and Dublin Scars

showcase back-porch storytelling, while Old Man Mickey and Fitzpatrick's Mourning bring a rough-edged humour that feels unique to us. For the covers, we reimagined Red Haired Mary, The Auld Triangle, and The Wild Rover with a Celtwave spin.

"Freakshow is home-made, down to the recording and mixing. We have always recorded, produced, mixed, and mastered everything ourselves. Even our music videos are all in house and self-produced. This time, we recorded the album in Billy's basement in Cliffside Park, NJ; just in time before his wife gave birth to their first child, Charlie Anna Houlihan, on the thirteenth of May. We sent the record to get mixed in Atlanta, GA by Zack Odom and Kenneth Mount, and then sent it to John Naclerio at Nada Recording in Middletown, NY for

"I asked him about the line-up. "We're still the same crooked crew at heart: Shannon Cokeley: guitar/vocals, Myself on: banjo/bagpipes/bouzouki/fiddle/vocals, Tommy Ma: bodhran and vocals, and Michael "Zeus" Zayas on accordion/mandolin/piano & whistle. Sometimes we add John Damiano on a full drum kit, who brings some extra sonic mischief. Everyone writes, everyone yells, and somehow it all comes together on stage."


Much has happened for Billy and the band. "We've got lots of life changes with a new baby born, and one due in September, but it doesn't stop us from touring and having fun with our music; you might just end up seeing a couple very small versions of us at the gigs!"



How does he assess the progress Sheridan Rúitín has made since their last recording? "We've come some way, both musically and as a band. Our last recording was more traditional, but Freakshow is us kicking the doors open. We've grown more confident in our sound; blending the Celtic roots we love with the storytelling punch of folk rock and the experimentation of pop and rock. We've taken more creative risks, pushed the boundaries of what Celtic folk can be, and found a voice that's truly our own. It's rawer, bolder, and weirder. We are looking forward to sharing it with the world!"

CELTIC WORLD FORUM BUILDING LINKS AND RESILIENCE THIS OCTOBER

Mark Lysaght spoke with Grammy-nominated singer Éabha McMahon via Zoom recently to find out more about this all-inclusive gathering of music professionals and enthusiasts, which is scheduled in Dublin this coming October.



he Celtic World Forum is an innovative event which has been running for the past two years; it invited participants to immerse themselves in the essence of Irish traditional, folk and Celtic music. This has drawn an international audience with people travelling from various parts of the world to attend, along with Irish people who wish to explore the tradition in more depth.

"Having been involved in singing with Anúna and (later) Celtic Woman since my teens, I had a great opportunity to observe how people reacted who engage fully with participants, sharing their experience of the tradition and culture with evening concerts open to a wider audience. Daytime events include talks, panel discussions, workshops and song circles. In the last two years, performers have included Anúna, Moya Brennan, Horslips, Seamus and Caoimhe Uí Fhlatharta, Máiréad Nesbitt, Tara Howley, Eimear Quinn, Michael McGlynn and James Greenan (Riverdance lead dancer). Éabha and Shane have access to a wide range of performers from their various involvements in musical projects, and they take great care to select people who are best suited to the concept of providing a fully immersive experience for those attending.

Éabha is a native of Dalkey, County Dublin and this year's event will be held in Fitzpatrick's Castle Hotel, Killiney from October 21st to 23rd.

While the line-up of artists has not yet been announced, it looks like there will be a range of major artists involved, as those performers who have already taken part have been extremely complimentary about the benefits they see for themselves from engaging with attendees, and sharing their life experiences in an informal setting. "Even at this early stage, it's clear that a network is emerging, where the participants and artists interact and bond, and a number of spin-off events have already been organised," Éabha told me. "The Forum has become a tree which keeps growing, with branches emerging all the time, it just keeps expanding into new areas."

Éabha feels that there is enormous potential in the Celtic World Forum, which solidifies the connection between artists and their audience, and the artist feedback has been universally positive as they discover how listeners react to a more detailed insight into their creative processes. Her own musical journey began when she was a small child, and at a relatively young age she has a wealth of experience in the music industry, and is also composing music which reflects her position as a person with deep concerns about the modern world and its impact on ordinary people. With two small children, she is concerned about what kind of world they will

to Irish music and song across the world. Anúna were very involved in collaborative events such as workshops, which I found really inspiring, and I felt that there was a need for an event where people could experience interaction with major artists at first hand, incorporating workshops, talks and concerts," Éabha explained. While with Celtic Woman, she formed a close professional bond with their manager Shane McDonnell, who had previously managed Clannad. Together, they collaborated on several music projects, and it was during this period that they developed the idea, which became the Celtic World Forum.

In the aftermath of Covid, Éabha and Shane decided to go ahead with the first event and were at the planning stage when an unexpected setback happened. "My husband John was involved in a bad accident, and Shane suggested that we postpone the project," said Éabha. "But John insisted that we go ahead." Once the format was publicised, the response was amazing, and places were filled very quickly. It's clear from speaking with Éabha that she is absolutely passionate about the event and its benefits to those taking part, and that there is a great support network in place to ensure that each year builds on the previous one. "Shane has been a fantastic partner in the organisation of Celtic World Forum, and we complement each other's skills and competencies in a way that enables us to develop new ideas for each year, and expand on existing formats."

Key to the success of previous events has been the involvement of artists



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

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

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CLIMBING THE CHARTS WITH 'THE STILL OF THE NIGHT'

Seán Laffey talks to Caitríona O'Sullivan whose single *The Still of the Night* was Number 1 in the Irish iTunes charts, co-written by Caitríona and composer-arranger Gavin Murphy.



rish based readers may know Caitríona from her 21 years as a judge on TG4's country music series *Glór Tíre*, she is also an award-winning singer-songwriter, television personality, and fluent Irish speaker. Her chart topping single has a distinctly Irish character thanks to its arrangement, which features: Gavin Murphy (composer/ producer /piano and strings), Keith Farrell (upright bass), Anna Connolly (Irish traditional flute), Mark Redmond (uilleann pipes). There is another possibly more important reason why it echoed so strongly with Irish listeners, and that is the honesty and the vulnerability at the song's core.

Caitríona says there are times in our lives that are pivotal, that define who we are and give us the opportunity to reassess our priorities. There's probably nothing as impactful as the passing of a parent and for Caitríona, the song came out of such a time of change. The song was written in 2012 when the economy was turning sour and emigration was once again scouring Ireland. Caitríona could see the hurt that separation was causing and this gave her the inspiration to write the song.

both her and us that things would go on. She passed away only a few hours later that same night. These events were the catalyst that gave me the courage to start my own family. I realised that beyond my career and my music, family was the bedrock that I wanted to build my future life on."

She sang *The Still of The Night* to her mother on that final day, but Caitríona wasn't ready for it to take on its finished form or be released to the public. "Grief isn't something you have control over, it might be a cliché but it does take time to process and be accepting of it. Even when I had the song released and it was getting media attention last May, I was surprised how emotionally affected I was when journalists asked me about my mother. The emotions all came back to me so vividly, it seemed as if it was only yesterday."

Caitríona thinks the song did so well because it deals with the "dark night of the soul" that we all must confront from time to time. When a loved one passes, a child emigrates or a relationship ends, we are left by ourselves to figure out questions like how did we get here and where are we going now? I think we all search for that deeper meaning in our lives.

The single is accompanied by a stunning video filmed in Kerry in the area where Caitríona's mother Marion grew up on her family's small farm. Caitríona says "Cinetex film produced it. Colm Sexton shot and edited the video with Paulina Kiewesz assisting, Aaron Egerton shot some stunning drone footage, my friend Sarah O Connor chose the locations and shot the promotional photos, and my friend Diane Jeffers styled me for the shoot. I am blessed with the support of family and friends, and my sisters Eileen and Rose did my hair and makeup. It was a family affair! The scenery and the landscape we chose were very dear to my mother: Glenbeigh beach, Dook's beach Cromane, Caragh Lake, all near to her homeplace in Tullig, near Cromane in County Kerry."

The public response has been massive of course, but what of her own family? "My children were born after Mom passed, but we

"My mother passed away in 2012, she had cancer and the time between her diagnosis and leaving us was very short." Knowing that her mother's time was limited focused Caitríona to concentrate on deeply personal priorities. She moved back home to Tralee (she had been teaching music and Irish at Mount Anville in Dublin). Once back home, not only did she care for her mother but began to reassess her life. "My partner of 13 years said it was time for us to get married and on the afternoon before my mother passed on, we had a simple blessing ceremony at home with her. He went to the bank, got some money out and went to the jewellers and bought a ring. We invited the parish priest in to bless us and perform the last rites for Mom. It was a lovely way to assure

DESTINATION 'GLEANN AN CHEOIL'!

Seán Laffey talks to Rónán Ó Dochartaigh, the Irish language director of Oideas Gael, a social enterprise that has been active in the Donegal Gaeltacht since 1984, where it offers a range of adult oriented courses, each with the Irish language at its heart.



ideas Gael is centred in Gleann Cholm Cille, a wild unspoilt landscape in south west Donegal. Rónán begins with a sincere acknowledgement. "We have to thank the tireless work of the late Fr James McDyer, the Glenties native, who did so much to foster community enterprises and the living Irish language in the area. He was a real inspiration and champion here, so much so that in 1984 Liam Ó Cuinneagáin, who had been teaching in Dublin, set up our centre here in the Glen. And suffice to say it has grown from strength to strength ever since."

Immersion in the language happens here by being part of a living linguistic community, which is how those early courses began, as Rónán explains. "While language courses are a core part of our programme, we gradually introduced various cultural activity holidays over the years. The first of these involved hikes

across the hills and valleys of the area, it was a gentle yet physically rewarding introduction to the language. The slow pace of the hike, and the chance to learn the stories behind features in the landscape was a popular foundation for the many courses that followed in their wake.

"Walking around the scenic landscape was a wonderful way of introducing people to the language, the folklore and the culture of the area. It was an informal way to pick up phrases, idioms and aspects of the language that many people might have forgotten or lost since their days at school, or if they were coming to the course with absolutely no knowledge of the language at all.

"Our music offerings began with flute and tin whistle. And we continue this to this day with a programme that runs over a week. Our initial meeting is on the Saturday where we introduce our tutors, and take a tour of the facilities. By Sunday, friendships

are beginning to form and reticence about rusty language is beginning to fade away. It is an enjoyable week of immersion in music and language.

"Outside of the lockdown years, we offer courses to over two thousand students a year, and we've had the pleasure of working with at least 70 teachers from all over Ireland. In fact, even beyond, we've had people from New York and Saskatchewan who have grá for the Irish language and who have been great ambassadors for the culture. Last year we had attendees from 30 different countries, as many as 40% of our participants come from outside of Ireland.

"We have a wonderful location here in the Sliabh Liag peninsula. Being on the peninsula there is a coastal character to the settlements in the west of the region, and we are well served with good restaurants, pubs, a food store and a post office. The area has not succumbed to the anonymity of AirBnB, so our attendees often stay in family run guest houses where they will have chance to chat in Irish over the breakfast. Local people are very welcoming and are happy to share anecdotes and stories with our visitors, no two days are the same. Outside of the music classes there is a sense of being part of something ancient and connected.

"We run courses all year round and our centre is in almost constant use, except for when we hand it over to Cairdeas na bhFidiléirí for their annual fiddle week. Thanks to the tireless work of Aidan O'Donnell, Rab Cherry and Caoimhín MacAoidh, Donegal fiddle music has seen a vibrant resurgence in the past three decades. Their 40th Donegal Fiddle Summer School runs here in Glencolmcille, from Monday 4th to Friday the 8th of August."

Rónán sums up our chat by saying the social enterprise helps build up a sense of self esteem in what might be otherwise a marginal area on the extreme west of Ireland. "Our aim here at Oideas Gael is to ensure that areas such as Gleann Cholm Cille are economically, socially and culturally viable, that people have a sense of their history, and then this can be happily and proudly shared amongst themselves and across the world."



Often defined as contemporary Irish World music, Kíla fuse the effects of their own melodies and Irish (Gaeilge) lyrics, Irish folk instruments such as whistles, fiddles, Uilleann pipes, bones and bodhrán with djembe, congas, drums, mandolins, brass, and acoustic/electric/bass guitars. Kíla's eight members come from the differing musical backgrounds of traditional, classical, and rock. The result is a fresh blend of freewheeling instrumentals, furious jigs, and primal rhythms that transcend the traditional boundaries of Irish music.

bluegrass with the heart and soul of folk and Appalachian music—spiced up with an Italian seasoning for extra flair! Gadan is a fresh project created by seasoned Italian musicians from the Irish trad and European folk/rock scene, all with years of experience performing at major traditional and alternative music festivals across Europe and the US. The band originally featured four members, all Italian, bringing exceptional skill and passion to Irish traditional music and old-time American styles—a distinctive and remarkable combination. Among the founding members are Lorenzo Testa and Jacopo Ventura, both longtime performers on international stages.

In 2024, they were joined by Enda Scahill, a tenor banjo master, award-winner, All-Ireland champion, and founder of We Banjo 3. With Enda, Gadan expanded into a five-member band. Together, Gadan and Enda performed at all the major Irish festivals across the US during August 2024, marking the start of an exciting collaboration that is set to continue into the future. Their high-energy repertoire has a powerful live appeal, reminiscent of new-trad acts, but with a unique identity. With three banjos-tenor and clawhammer-fiddle, mandolin, and guitar, they create a distinctive "strings-only" sound, enhanced by subtle electronics and driven by a powerful rhythmic pulse. In 2025, the band completed its line-up with the addition of Eric Long, a gifted clawhammer banjoist and singer-songwriter originally from the mountainous heart of Pennsylvania—a region deeply rooted in Appalachian tradition—and now based in San Francisco. Eric brings a raw, authentic American folk soul to the group's transatlantic sound, further expanding their dynamic and diverse musical identity.

Kíla have worked extensively in TV and film. In 2020 they won the IFTA for Best Original Score for the soundtrack or *Arracht* (TG4). Their most notable collaborations have been with French composer Bruno Coulais on the soundtracks for Cartoon Saloon's three Oscarnominated animated films *The Secret of Kells* (2010), *Song of the Sea* (2014), and most recently for *Wolfwalkers* (2020).

Bog Bodies

Bog Bodies emerges as a powerhouse Irish ensemble, masterfully blending traditional Irish melodies with a contemporary, raw edge. Inspired by the enigmatic megalithic sites of Ireland, the band is formed by songwriter and archaeologist, Dan Maher. Their genrebending, high-energy folk sound is characterised by the interplay of traditional Irish instruments such as the bodhrán, flute, and mandolin with guitars and drums, creating a unique blend of old and new, earthy and electric. Combining the storytelling traditions of Irish folk with the raw intensity of rock and a dash of world music for good measure. Bog Bodies' songs are charged from the ancient megalithic sites of Ireland and are often political, ethereal, and Celtic/Pagan in theme. The band's name is inspired by the ancient bog bodies that have been discovered in





Ireland, which were preserved in peat bogs for centuries, giving them a deep and mysterious aura. This fascination with the ancient and mystical is a recurring theme in the band's music, which is infused with the spirit of the land and the stories of its people.

Fionn and Jonathan Angus

Fionn Crombie Angus is a left-handed fiddle player with Down syndrome. After performing at the inaugural TradFest/AbleFest programme in Dublin earlier this year, he was named TradFest

Ambassador and will appear on the stage at Milwaukee Irish Fest, accompanied by his father, Jonathan. Fionn and Jonathan are co-directors of Fionnathan Productions, a social enterprise.

You can pronounce it Fionnathan or Fear Nuthin'—close enough. Fionn is a regular fixture of the

Galway arts scene: a filmmaker and visual artist as well as a traditional musician. To help clarify Fionn's goals, he has conducted nearly 800 video interviews, asking, "What do you love about your life?" As a result, Fionn can rightly be considered a happiness expert, and his YouTube channel, Finnathan Presents: The Happiness Project, has more than 5 million views. He combines his music skills with his deep love of nature as a Heritage Expert, teaching children about animals and traditional Irish culture in schools across Ireland and internationally. He has performed on national TV numerous times. They each received Remy Martin Irish Men of the Year 2025 Awards: Fionn as Diversity and Inclusion Advocate and Jonathan as Arts and Culture Advocate. Working with numerous organisations, they have led advocacy courses and family consultations, published works, served on government committees, and presented at conferences worldwide, and together they have visited over two dozen countries. They perform as part of Milwaukee's partnership with TradFest.

SuperCéilí

Traditional Irish tunes meet advanced technology in the SuperCéilí live show. A unique array of acoustic and digital instruments create a fully-live Irish Dance Music experience. With its gigantic sound and stagepresence, SuperCéilí drives crowds wild and has introduced a new audience to the passion and spontaneity of Ireland's culture.

They are known for their fast paced and rhythmic style of dance that they developed after training at the Hession School of Irish Dance in Galway, Ireland.

Garron Noone

Garron is an online comedy content creator and musician from Mayo. He burst onto the scene in late 2022 by posting videos on TikTok, quickly becoming one of Ireland's most recognised creators, captivating audiences far beyond the Emerald Isle. In addition to his comedic talents, Garron is a professional musician and has participated in the BBC's radio series Big Comic Energy. He also hosts the food podcast Listen, I'm Delicious, where he combines his love for humour and culinary delights. Look forward to music, laughs, and great craic at his Milwaukee Irish Fest shows. He'll perform all four days of the festival.

LÉDA

LÉDA hail from Balla, Co Mayo and the Shetland Isles respectively and are now based in Glasgow. The duo features both Éadaoin Ní Mhaicín, a multi-award winning instrumentalist who holds a staggering amount of world titles and Amy Laurenson, who was recently named BBC Radio Scotland Young Traditional Musician of the Year 2023.

Strange Boy

Strange Boy is redefining the landscape of Irish music. With a voice that echoes the seanchaí of old and a delivery that pulses with the urgency of modern hip-hop, he has carved out a space entirely his own. Fusing the raw storytelling tradition of Ireland with the rhythm and cadence of rap, his work is both deeply rooted and boundary-breaking—an unmistakable force in contemporary music. A live Strange Boy performance is something to behold. His words—poetic, piercing, relentless—cut through melodies steeped in the ancient sounds of tin whistle, bodhrán, and banjo. Now, as he prepares to release his highly anticipated second album in summer 2025, Strange Boy steps onto festival stages armed with a fresh collection of songs-music that speaks to identity, struggle, and survival in a language both timeless and unmistakably of the moment. Strange Boy is not just an artist to watch—he is one to experience.

Conor Mallon, Unearthed

You may recognise Conor Mallon from the band Connla. Now, he's blazing his own trail with his latest project, Unearthed. Conor's debut solo





album has burst onto the folk/trad scene with "high-octane production," as hailed by The Irish Times. His music blends powerful original compositions that honour tradition while pushing the boundaries of uilleann pipes. The end result? An unveiling of the beauty of the uilleann pipes.

Elias Alexander

Elias Alexander is a rare performer who combines live looping and electronics with a wide variety of instruments from bagpipes to fiddle, guitar, whistle and keys. With deep roots in traditional Celtic and American music, but a boundless appetite for possibility, rhythm, and expression, Elias takes audiences on a mind blowing journey through traditional tunes, original songs, and danceable fun.

Elias Alexander grew up in Ashland, Oregon, where he studied pipes and fiddle from a young age. Moving to the east coast in 2009, he made a name for himself as one of the foremost exponents of traditional Scottish music in America, touring with numerous groups and playing many of the top Celtic festivals including Celtic Connections (2017 with Gillebride MacMillan) and Celtic Colours (2019 with Farsan). He currently tours as the pipes and whistle player with Scottish legends Old Blind Dogs in North America.

Elias's latest project, *Ramblxr*, arose out of the early lockdowns of 2020, when he found himself blending the traditional acoustic music of his youth with house, disco, hip-hop, and lo-fi sounds. Emerging with his new

They both are captivating exponents of their traditional fiddle music. Among the many accolades and awards Maebh has received are two All-Ireland fiddle titles, Fiddler of Dooney, 2019, the Ed Reavy Award in 2023, and the national Scor na nOg. We urge any fiddle enthusiasts to make sure they get the opportunity to see this remarkable young Irish fiddler perform for her very first time in the U.S.

AN IRISH CULTURAL EXPERIENCE AWAITS AT MILWAUKEE IRISH FEST

Check out presentations on Irish history, culture, language, and more, plus cultural displays throughout the festival weekend.



he 45th Milwaukee Irish Fest features a full slate of cultural programming that goes far beyond music. From language and literature to history, theatre, dance, and hands-on experiences, the festival continues to showcase the depth and breadth of Irish culture both traditional and evolving — through its immersive Cultural Village.

At the Cultural Pavilion, visitors can explore a curated cross-section of Irish history, heritage, and identity. This year, the Pavilion places special emphasis on Irish dance, highlighting its historical significance and geographic reach. Explore a new exhibit that tells the story of Irish dance in Milwaukee, tracing its roots back to 1966 when the Shamrock Club launched its own troupe, helping to seed what is now a thriving community of eight Irish dance schools in the area.

Adding a youthful creative touch, the Murals on Ireland project will return with large-scale canvases painted by Milwaukee-area middle schoolers. Coordinated by Milwaukee Public Schools with contributions from neighbouring districts, these four-by-eight-foot artworks portray student interpretations of Ireland's landscapes, folklore, and symbols.

The Cultural Pavilion also continues to explore lesser-known corners of Irish identity. The Irish

Mexicans exhibit, a collaboration between Mexican Fiesta (a festival that takes place in Milwaukee at the Henry Maier Festival Park) and Milwaukee Irish Fest, delves into the rich intersection of Irish and Mexican history. Other returning favourites include Celtic Cures, which looks at traditional Irish remedies and folk medicine, and Irish Science Fiction, which traces Irish contributions to the genre. A new display will spotlight County Mayo, offering visitors a glimpse of the stories and traditions from this culturally rich region. Additionally, IBAM Chicago (Irish Books, Arts, and Music) and the Irish American Hall of Fame will each contribute engaging content for festivalgoers to explore.

Outside the pavilion, the festival grounds offer even more to discover. The Sacred Trees of Ireland installation returns, inviting attendees to reflect on the symbolic and spiritual significance of trees in Celtic tradition. Nearby, the Irish Currach Club of Milwaukee will host currach races along the lagoon, including Saturday's noon regatta with exciting





relay competitions. Visitors can also stop by the currach tent to learn about the historic boat and join Sunday's Knitting Circle (1–4 PM), where participants of all ages can knit an Irish pattern — no experience needed, and supplies are provided.

The Literary Corner shines a spotlight on authors whose work explores Irish or Celtic topics and themes. Among this year's featured writers is Leora O'Carroll, Emmy-nominated producer and co-author of Maureen O'Carroll: A Musical Memoir of an Irish Immigrant Childhood. This poignant memoir, selected for IrishCentral's "Ultimate Irish Reading List," captures the immigrant experience in 1930s and '40s Australia. O'Carroll brings a dual artistic perspective as both writer and musician.

Visitors seeking language immersion will find it in the Gaeltacht area, a dynamic hub for Irish language and culture. This year's lineup features sean-nós dancing with Caoimhe Ní Mhaolagáin, performances by Kíla and Enda Reilly, and an open invitation to engage with the language through music, dance, and conversation.

In the Theatre Pavilion, festivalgoers can experience the premiere of Willow, a powerful new play by Catherine McKiernan. Set in a small seaside town in the west of Ireland, it's a story of love, secrets, and redemption unfolding over a single day. Also at the Theatre Pavilion is Keith Corcoran, seanchaí and author of Finding Fairy Mysteries in Donegal, who weaves spine-tingling tales of banshees, haunted islands, and ancient Irish lore in the oral storytelling tradition.

For thought-provoking discussion, the Hedge School is the place to be. Highlights this year include Dr. Niamh Hamill on the poetry of Irish landscapes, Julianne Stanz on fairy folklore, and historian Damian Shiels on the Irish experience in the American Civil War. Topics range from politics and genealogy to literature and contemporary identity.

Finally, no celebration of Irish culture would be complete without food and drink. Classic dishes like bangers and mash and shepherd's pie will be available throughout the festival weekend. Jameson Whiskey returns with multiple bars and immersive experiences, and new this year is Bunratty Meade, bringing their traditional Irish mead products to the grounds for the first time in decades.

Milwaukee Irish Fest continues to evolve, all while honouring the roots and traditions of Irish culture. Whether you're seeking history, music, language, or a taste of Ireland itself, there's something waiting for you in every corner of the festival grounds.



ELIAS ALEXANDER STARTS HIS OWN DANCE PARTY

Michael Lange catches up with the multi-instrumentalist moving people to hear traditional music in new ways.



ortland, Oregon-based Elias Alexander circled the globe this Spring, playing festivals in Australia, Italy and Scotland before heading home to ready himself for a round of summer festivals in the U.S and Europe. Melding fiddle, guitar, whistles, keyboard, percussion and pipes with Electronic Dance Music (EDM), he's forging an innovative solo path through traditional music designed to move people toward joy and healing.

Michael: At the start of the pandemic, you were asked to make some music for a virtual ceilidh and your Ramblxr project was born?

Elias: Summer McCall directs the Boston Celtic Music Festival. She also calls dances at Sierra Fiddle Camp. She said, "do you want to put together some music for an online ceilidh?" I thought, why don't I try to use the sort of pop music sensibility and production that I've been working on for a few years to make a dance track? The first track I made was Fiddle Disco. I put this kind of pop production into the same space

Elias: Ramblxr is going to be an album. I am working on completing it. I spent eight days in Nashville in February finishing the recording, editing and mixing. There are going to be a few singles and then the album will come out at some point this summer, and we'll see where we go from there. I'm really excited to get all this music out.

Michael: You created a music video on YouTube for Right Now (at Angel's Rest). I think it's an incredible piece of music. Your friends hiking 3 miles up the mountain with you and your equipment to make that says a lot about you, Elias.

Elias: Well, I've just always loved that spot. It's one of my favourite hikes anywhere in the world. It's just a beautiful, incredible spot. It almost kind of feels like you're flying when you're up there. I thought it would be so cool to play this song that has some moments that feel like they're kind of soaring in that spot. I'm so grateful that my friends were willing to go on this crazy hike. It wouldn't have been so crazy if it hadn't been 100 degrees and smoky in August, but actually the smoke ended up making for some really beautiful soft light in the video.

Michael: You seem to me to be a creative spirit at heart. You write about yourself that you weave melodies with catchy beats and original songs that discuss themes of alienation, belonging, and queerness?

Elias: I think this is really the essence. I've always felt a little bit outside of society in certain ways and struggled to find a home and a connection to community and to land. That's really where traditional music came from in my life. When I first experienced it, it felt like this thread of connection and I followed that and I followed it for years. That desire to be in conversation with community, with land, with my own history and my family's history and our journeys across this planet, and to engage with this music that has been carried across generations and sustained communities and sustained joy, even in really difficult times;

as a fiddle tune. Then Cayley Schmid, who was the director of the Bellingham Celtic Festival, said, "can you do this live?" I spent nine months trying to figure out how to do this music live. I had to come up with a whole system. I ended up doing that show in Bellingham and people were very enthusiastic about it and it felt like this really could be something.

Michael: You've said that, "many of the tunes we play in the traditional music world, such as jigs and reels, are dance tunes, but in our current form of performance, the audience is seated. When you combine it with electronic music, which makes people want to move their bodies, and add traditional music, people can hear tunes in a new way."

Elias: Trad music has always hit me as incredibly energetic and incredibly rhythmic and complex. It makes me want to dance and that's what the tunes were written for. For some reason, most people don't necessarily hear it like that. I think that's maybe changing as there are more and more festivals and shows where people are jumping up and down and dancing. People are coming because they want to dance and then they really connect with the pipe tunes and fiddle tunes and melodies. I've had a lot of people come up and say this felt like it connected them to something that was missing in their life. I've always really wanted more people to appreciate it and to feel the power of trad tunes, the way that I feel them myself. So it's been really beautiful to see that happen at my shows.

Michael: You mentioned Fiddle Disco. That came out and went viral on Instagram with over a million views. You're creating a collection of pieces under the title Ramblxr. Is there going to be a complete or final version of it?

that desire for connection is what has kept me going and what's kept me playing this music.

It's my hope that in talking about the stories of my life and my family and this music and the land that I live on in Oregon and wherever I travel, that I can create a sense of belonging for myself and for people who come to the show and also talk about what we're facing as a society, as we're facing some difficult moments, especially right now. I hope that by wrapping this history and my experience into something that can reach out to others and invite them into a welcoming space where we can celebrate life and celebrate healing and celebrate this music and connection, that I can offer a space of peace and hope and resistance in this time.

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FESTIVAL INTERCELTIQUE DE LORIENT 2025

L'année des Cousins d'Amérique – The Year of the American Cousins. Mick Walsh reports from Paris.



his year FIL will celebrate the music of L'Arc Atlantique; the idea that the Celtique nations are united by the Atlantic Ocean. For centuries, people have emigrated to America from Ireland, Scotland, Brittany, Wales, Cornwall, Galicia, Asturias, crossing the Atlantic with their music and culture. In 2025 the Festival celebrates these 'Celtes du Nouveau Monde' (the New World Celts) and the evolution of Celtique music in the Americas."

Artistic director, Jean-Philippe Mauras is anticipating *une belle 54th édition* running over 10 days from 1st August and involving more than 5,000 musicians, singers, dancers and visual artists from across the diaspora. The scale is staggering, the world's largest Celtique gathering, comprising 300 performances across 12 venues, facilitated by 1700 volunteers and attracting 950,000 visitors each year.

The Festival's central theme is *Interceltism*, and the American Cousins are an integral part. "In 2025 we're focused on the East Coast of

town; the sound of a bagad warming up is a uniquely enchanting sound."

The Kilkennys, back by popular demand, will ignite an evening of energetic ballads, jigs and reels at Le Palais on Sat 2nd, The Friel Sisters play Le Kleub on Saturday 2nd and on Tuesday 5th, Zoe Conway and John McIntyre will perform at Vox Celtes.

This year marks the launch of several new concepts. JP explains, "we've created *La Taverne Celte*, where people come to eat, drink, listen and participate in the culture of each Celtic nation, Sunday 3rd will be la soirée Irlande. We've also created new elements to strengthen our appeal to a new generation. Since its launch in 2022, Le Kleub has been a revelation, an ephemeral contemporary Celtique music venue – hosting every night diverse musical offerings with very contemporary sounds, and the evening closes with electronic music in the form of creation or DJ Set."

One of these new generation groups is Belfast-based tradtronica

America, particularly Louisiana, New York State and Massachusetts, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Quebec, Newfoundland and Labrador, and we've invited groups representative of these communities. From Quebec, Le Vent du Nord will perform with Orchestre National de Bretagne on Wed 6th August. Lynda Lemay is a Canadian singer immensely popular in France and we're also bringing the fiddling sensation Dominique Dupuis, and the Canadian theme will continue with the Scottish generational trad-punk group The Real McKenzies. SOLAS will represent the Boston region as part of their 30th anniversary world tour and will share top billing with LUNASA at la Grande Nuit Irlando-américaine on Tuesday 5th."

From an Irish perspective, highlights include the inimitable FLOOK performing at Le Palais on Monday 2nd on their 25th anniversary tour, sharing une Soirée Légendes Celtiques with the iconic whistle player Mary Bergin. Flook's Brian Finnegan reflects, "few festivals in the world have such enduring, incomparable mystique. I first played FIL in the early 90s and it was a life changing experience. We met an Ulster Pipe band, so it was tense at first but over the week, hardline indoctrinated beliefs were dissolved and on our last night we played side by side in The Galway Inn, until early morning. It was an awakening, how much environment shapes us. In 2022 with Flook, Lorient's heartbeat was stronger than ever, music spilling out of bars and alleyways all over

group Huartan who tap into a pagan past to imaginatively blend ancient and modern. This exciting trio will showcase their innovative homage to Ulster musical and oral traditions, a sensual performance including high-energy costumed dancers, at Le Kleub on Tuesday 5th.

2025 will herald the launch of ÉlectroFIL, "it's une grosse soirée electro running over 6 hours; a new concept dedicated to electronic music, opening up a captivating sonic universe with an exceptional lineup including Dublin-based techno Trad group Yard, whose electrifying performances have energized audiences across Europe. It's a genre that is immensely popular with younger audiences."

On Saturday 9th, Bláth and West Kerry's Cuas will perform at La Place des Pays Celtes, an event that will be recorded by TG4. On Saturday 2nd on the Quai de la Bretagne, Wexford-based traditional Irish fusion band Tulua will build on their international touring success with their unique beautifully mystical sound.

The Festival Interceltique Lorient 2025 promises a heady cocktail of Celticism with an American twist, infused with East Coast influences and contemporary ÉlectroFIL vibes. With its pure Trad credentials firmly rooted, this year's Festival focus is also to the future, a testament to an evolving living tradition. Bravo!

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Mark Lysaght spoke with Enda to find out more about his recent activities and plans for the rest of the year.



nda Reilly is a prolific and versatile singer, songwriter and guitarist, originally from Dublin but now based in Detroit, Michigan, USA. He has received a number of awards and accolades, most recently being named Male Vocalist of the Year 2024 by Sharon Iberle Smith of *Ireland Tonight* on WDCB Radio Chicago.

Enda is a very engaging character, full of creative ideas to develop his music and songwriting; we initially met just after the Covid pandemic and since then we've maintained contact via Zoom.

"Not long ago, I was back in Ireland for a short tour, and I got a chance to perform my WB Yeats show at the National Library, where the Yeats exhibition is, and also did an Irish language workshop at the Pearse Street Library. I also got to perform at the Nighthawks show in the United Arts Club which was very

He's used the mythology theme on the title track of his latest album *Hy-Brasil*, where he reimagines an island under the sea, reputed to lie near Clew Bay off the west coast of Mayo. "Historically, it's referred to by French sailors in the 1700s and I imagine taking a journey from Croagh Patrick and then walking underwater to find it. Overall, the album represents my status as an Irish musician living and working in the USA, my mind is actually somewhere in between," said Enda.

It's all original songs, and it's a lovely collection, full of personal reflections on his homeland and life experiences with songs composed in English and Irish. He includes two co-writes with Enda Cullen and one with Aisling Kavanagh. He used content from the Irish Folklore Archive to create songs like *A Sign Of Rain; Gráinne Mhaol* celebrates Grace O'Malley cutting her hair so she could enlist as a sailor. *Na Lochlannaigh* is inspired by the Viking incursions into Ireland, other songs like *Off The Grid For A While* relate to real-life experiences.

Always seeking new ways to engage with his growing audience, Enda will launch his new fan-supported platform, *Tír Enda*, with a special livestream concert on July 19th at www.endareilly.com/tirenda. Tír Enda, meaning "Enda's Land", will be a subscription based space offering exclusive content, unreleased songs, livestreams, behind-the-scenes insights, and access to Enda's deep catalogue of original and traditional Irish music.

"This is a place where I can share the quieter side of what I do: the songs, stories, and poems that connect us through Irish culture and language," said Enda. The inaugural livestream will feature a mix of original songs, traditional ballads, and personal reflections to celebrate the launch.

Enda is very upbeat about developing his music using all the tools at his disposal, spreading the message of Irish culture and folklore in his adopted home in Michigan, where he has been based since

enjoyable," Enda told me. "I was accompanying a group of American tourists who came along with me to various parts of Ireland, especially Dublin where I introduced them to venues that I had played previously. We also visited Kilkenny, Clonmacnoise and took a trip up the River Shannon."

This came about when a Michigan-based company called Triskel Tours & Celtic Treasures approached Enda to host a tour group who wanted a more immersive experience while visiting. It worked out so well that further visits are in the pipeline. Meanwhile, closer to home, Enda was just getting ready to participate in the Motor City Irish Festival, Detroit's very own Celtic festival. He has a busy summer ahead, not only performing his regular shows in Michigan, but featuring at several festivals across the USA, including Penn-Mar Irish Festival (Pennsylvania), Iowa Irish Fest, Milwaukee Irish Fest (Wisconsin), Peoria Irish Fest (Illinois), Kansas City Irish Fest (Missouri) and Beaver Island Irish Festival (Michigan). His live performances weave threads of Irish culture, language, and history into a rich tapestry of song, with the Irish language to the fore and Enda's deep interest in Irish history and mythology, as well as the poetry of WB Yeats (the subject of one of his albums – To The Waters And The Wild).

2019. He still manages to maintain a deep connection with his homeland, and has become a musical ambassador for Ireland. His website provides a wealth of information on his growing catalogue of recordings. "I'm keen to develop it as a valuable portal for people to visit and experience my material in a more immersive way, including live recordings," he told me.





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THE IRISH FAIR OF MINNESOTA Harriet Island, August 8-10, 2025

The state of Minnesota has always been supportive of Irish Music, writes John O'Regan.



ince the 1970s, some leading Irish musicians have settled there, names like Daithi Sproule, Paddy O'Brien, Darren Crossey and more suggest the state is a good home for both resident and visiting Irish players. Festival organiser Lucy Mullen filled me in on the details of this year's Irish Fair of Minnesota.

Lucy: "The Irish Fair of Minnesota offers an equal opportunity and a showcase for all things Irish in the local area. It was founded in 1980 by Roger Conway and Leah Curtin, the two eminent visionaries who contributed profoundly to the foundation and development of the Irish Fair of Minnesota. The legacy they left behind serves as a beacon of commitment and resilience to which others may aspire."

John: "What kind of crowds does the festival attract?"

Lucy: "This year's Irish Fair of Minnesota runs from Friday, August 8th through Sunday, August 10th, 2025. The festival is always the second full weekend in August. The weekend-long outdoor festival is on Saint Paul's with her storytelling and wit. Over 100 local bands, artists, and dance schools will feature during the weekend.

"Eileen Ivers, the Grammy-winning, 9-time All-Ireland fiddle champion, and original musical star of Riverdance, returns to the Irish Fair of Minnesota. On Saturday, she'll perform with the Universal Roots and then, on Sunday, she will take the stage with The Brigideens. The High Kings will close out the weekend with mighty craic!

"Special interest items include ZeroK Fun Run, a 3-metre race where everyone is a winner! Baarry, the Irish Fair mascot, will lead the fun on Saturday and Sunday at 2:30 p.m. The registration fee of \$45 supports the Irish Fair of Minnesota while the "athletes" will receive a complimentary beverage (beer, wine, or N/A), a bag of chips, and a commemorative jersey.

"Attendees enjoy traditional Irish dance, a variety of food stands, whiskey tastings, Irish sports demos (hurling, camogie, boxing), Irish comedy, a marketplace with handmade goods, educational and cultural programming, and activities for children."

John: "How do you finance such a diverse and inclusive festival?"

Lucy: "The Irish Fair of Minnesota has generous event sponsors and partners who help to keep this event going year after year. Decades-long partnerships are instrumental in hosting this event every year. Every board and staff member at Irish Fair works tirelessly to secure donations and sponsorships for the fair. This event is made possible by the voters of Minnesota through a grant from the Minnesota State Arts Board thanks to a legislative appropriation from the arts and cultural heritage fund. Funding cuts to major federal grants can hurt many cultural programs, and the Irish Fair does not take our relationships with the city, state, or corporate sponsors for granted."

John: "What plans and hopes do you have for its future?"

Lucy: "Bigger and better each year! We are hoping to bring in more sponsors every year, attract bigger crowds during the festival, and offer more entertainment. Irish Fair also hopes to host more events during the year, not just the annual weekend festival. As we can continue to promote

Harriet Island, celebrating all things Irish in Minnesota. We've been building a small version of the Emerald Isle on Harriet Island since 2001.

"The Minnesota Irish are a dedicated bunch. Even if it's raining setters and wolfhounds, we still see on average 11,000 people each day of the festival. Families spend all weekend on the island watching dancers, live music on the river, and enjoying great food, drink, and mighty craic. Groups of friends and local organisations share pints, laughs, and memories each year."

John: "What is on offer for your audience this August?"

Lucy: "This year's visiting headline acts come from Ireland and Scotland, mixing new talents with national festival bill-toppers as well as a healthy selection of local bands and players. Headlining acts on Friday include Talisk, the Scottish trio of Mohsen Amini (concertina), Benedict Morris (violin) and Charlie Galloway (guitar), who have been redefining the folk genre for almost a decade. On Saturday Gaelic Storm headlines, while The Diddley Idols, the husband-and-wife team of Queens native Dave Barckow and Dubliner Louise Barry, will bring a full band sound.

"Ally the Piper, a multi-instrumentalist and vocalist, best known for her work on the Great Highland Bagpipe, globetrotting Limerick troubadour Emma Langford has become a feature of the Irish folk and songwriter scene and cultivate Irish Culture and heritage in the Twin Cities, we are constantly expanding what that looks like and how to create spaces where people can come together and revel."

Seán Laffey talks to Peoria Irish Fest's Entertainment Chairman Tom McConnaughay.



he festival began back in 1981 as the Erin Fest in Peoria, Illinois, which is at the centre of a triangle of three cities, Chicago, St Louis and Indianapolis. It was rebranded under its present name in 2017.

Tom says, "we're actually one of the smaller festivals in the region, attracting around 8,000 people during our weekend, which happens between August 22nd and 24th this year. It's a great time of year because we're sandwiched between the two big festivals of Milwaukee and Kansas City and well organised touring acts are able to extend their performing schedules to take in all three, so it's a win-win for all of us.

"Sitting between those three bigger cities means we are able to draw on a large Celtic Diaspora, and it's something we are focusing Gadan, The Byrne Brothers, Conor Mallon/Unearthed, Síomha, Colm & Laura Keegan, RUNA, Hadrian's Wall, Elias Alexander, Enda Reilly and On the Lash. And, we are always proud to showcase our local and regional bands - Turas, The Bogside Zukes, The Roundstone Buskers, Broken Brogue, Skibbereen, Still Shine, The Morning Larks, Barry Cloyd and The McDowell's.

Tom attends other festivals around the States to observe audience reactions to live shows. "That's because a good proportion of Peoria's clientele might be described as Folk-curious, as they are not entirely die-hard traditional music fans or they don't all have Celtic ancestors. Our booked acts must be able to please a crowd and connect with people."

If stage craft is important for the bigger shows, then there is an equally engaging alternative, which is micro-scale in comparison. "We like to think our Fountain stage is a unique feature of our Fest. It is an unplugged, purely acoustic stage, it has chairs for 20 people in its audience, and we encourage our touring artists to perform, demonstrate, talk, or teach in a small-scale setting, and each year the result is pure magic. Last year one act taught the small crowd how to do a Scottish Ceilidh dance. Then when they performed on the main stage, the folks in the audience became part of the show."

Finally, Tom would like to thank several organisations for all the support they give to the festival. "I must really thank Culture Ireland who support so many of the artists we bring in, the Consulate General of Ireland in Chicago for their assistance with cultural programming, The Association of Irish and Celtic Festivals for their resources and knowledge, many of our fellow festivals, who are always happy to help, and of course our corporate and individual sponsors. With the help of all of these people and organisations, we

on for the future, as we have the capacity to cater to an even bigger audience than we do at the moment, so getting our name out and attending other festivals around the country is one of our main priorities, certainly in relation to growing the festival. Rest assured though, our number one priority is always the music."

I wondered do they know anything about their audience profile, who are they appealing to? "The surrounding States have a large Irish Diaspora and people who are keen to hear authentic Irish music, so we offer a mix of both homegrown and new and wellknown bands who come over from Ireland. Peoria itself has a large Catholic population which adds to the power of the festival to attract a local clientele. We are also lucky to partner with the Peoria St. Patrick's Day Parade, which enhances our yearlong visibility in the community."

Tom tells me a little about the venue itself. "We are situated downtown on a purpose-built festival site with a permanent stage. There is a large waterfront building from which we can administer the festival, and we also use it for one of our pubs which features whiskey tastings, cultural events and music. We have three main outdoor music stages, a dance stage, and fields for highland games and other events. One major benefit of being so close to the river is that we can enjoy the cooling breezes off the river if the weather heats up."

Tom outlines the main acts that will appear this August. "We are excited to welcome The Red Hot Chilli Pipers, The Kilkennys,

The Fest is held at the Peoria Riverfront Park, on the banks of the Illinois River, in down town Peoria, Illinois. Free parking is available. Gates open at 4:00 p.m. Friday, noon on Saturday and 10:00 a.m. Sunday for Mass.

38th INTERNATIONAL FEAKLE FESTIVAL OF TRADITIONAL IRISH MUSIC

The 38th International Feakle Festival of Traditional Irish Music returns from Wednesday, August 6th to Monday, August 11th, 2025. Seán Laffey spoke with festival Secretary Aoife Hayes, to find out what is planned for this August.



eakle is a village in the hilly wooded region of East Clare. Be careful because once there, you might never ever want to leave again, something many folk have been considering since 1987 when Gary Pepper got the first Feakle Festival into gear.

Aoife says, "the festival is literally the highlight of my year. My dad has been involved with the festival since it began and I've grown up with it. I wouldn't miss it for the world. This year's festival offers an exciting and varied programme with concerts, workshops, CD launches, céilís, singing sessions, informal music sessions, film screenings, children's activities, festival walks, lunchtime concerts, and much more, there is something for all ages and interests."



Who is booked to appear at the festival? Aoife tells us that audiences can look forward to performances from some of the most highly regarded names in traditional music, including: Martin Hayes, Brian Donnellan & Conal O'Kane, The Kilfenora Céilí Band, Caitlín Nic Gabhann & Ciarán Ó Maonaigh, Breanndán Ó Beaglaíoch, Clíodhna Ní Bheaglaoich & Cormac Begley, Andrea Palandri & Ruairí McGorman, Cáit Ní Rian & Ultan O'Brien, Charlie Harris, Eva Carroll, Seán Lyons, Cnoc na Gaoithe Band, Eimear Coughlan & Francis Cunningham, Sorcha Costello, Dermot Byrne & Tim Edey, Mary and Andrew MacNamara, Conor Crimmins, Tara Breen, Dermot Sheedy & Seán O'Meara, Máirín Fahy & Patsy Broderick, The Big Mad Horn Céilí

I was intrigued to find out about a special tribute concert celebrating Charlie Harris' contribution to traditional music and in particular to the musical life of Feakle.

"Charlie Harris has always been a great friend of the festival. He's played it with the Tulla Céili Band in Feakle and has been a member The Shaskeen, which has brought him around the world, but he's also deeply rooted in the village here, having played a regular Wednesday night session with Mark Donnellan in Pepper's pub for years. The special opening night concert is a great opportunity for the local people to really say thank you to Charlie for his years of music, his years of entertaining everybody. I am sure there will be lots of musicians in attendance both on stage and in the audience for the opening concert."

Aoife whets our appetite for the workshops at the Feakle Festival. "They offer visiting musicians the opportunity to pick up techniques, learn new tunes, meet like-minded people, and build their repertoire; and of course be taught by some of the finest players around. Our workshops run from Thursday through Saturday from 10am in the morning till 1pm in the afternoon. We would encourage people to book up early for the three days of workshops as they are very popular. We use a number of venues for music workshops. Our sean-nós dance classes, however, which are taught by Suzanne Leahy, are held in the large back room of Bohan's bar, which becomes the hub for traditional dancers during the festival."

Feakle is a small village, how does it cope with the influx of visitors? "Firstly, everyone is welcomed as each year the village is filled with musicians and well-wishers, they all become part of the community. Secondly, locals make rooms available in their homes to cater for the influx of visitors which is always a huge help. Our campsite is open throughout the festival. It's great value, it's only €10 euro per night to stay there. If you want to stay in the region, there are good hotels and B&Bs within a few minutes of us in Scariff, Gort and Killaloe."

he guitar has well earned its place as a favoured accompaniment instrument for Irish music. It was, however, a hard won and relatively recent battle. Resurrection came in the '60s and '70s thanks to folk legends such as Paul Brady, Micheal O'Domhnaill and Daithi Sproule. In many ways, you could say the guitar has opened the doors of traditional Irish music to musicians of other genres, which is exactly the point on which the purists and liberals diverge.

Guitar accompaniment fundamentally requires a deep familiarity with the unique rhythms of traditional Irish music. Many would argue that you can't teach rhythm, you have to feel it in your bones... so notwithstanding the difficulty, a good teacher can map out the territory. One such good teacher goes by the name of Jean Damei— living proof that the Irish tradition is not just for the Irish...

Jean Damei, born in Grenoble, France, started to play the guitar at the age of 16. After meeting a number of Irish musicians touring and teaching music in the Alps he discovered a passion for it. At the age of 18, he left Ardeche, his childhood home, to study guitar and flute in the Irish Music and Dance degree course at the University of Limerick. On his return to France, to Lyon in 2011, he decided to explore jazz and funk. He has found much inspiration from these

two musical universes, allowing him to accompany Irish melodies in a rich and varied way, and to work with new angles and approaches to the tradition. He is now based in Glasgow where his most recent projects include Elír, a trio also featuring vocalist and fiddler Niamh McKaveney and fiddler David Lambardi. His other cutting edge projects include Fourth Moon and Event Horizon.

The Course

Guitar Basics (in standard tuning) is for beginner guitarists who are new to Irish traditional music and would like to learn how to accompany it as well as established musicians who want to get an insight into this music. It will also be a great help to guitarists who have good experience of Irish music accompaniment and wish to go further in the development of their style.

First you will learn how to tune a guitar and how to read chord charts. Then you will move into a progressive study of techniques that focus on how to play accompaniment using simple chords, simple 4/4, 6/8, 3/4 or 9/8 rhythms, as well as syncopated rhythms and more complex chords. Jean uses a broad selection of well-known tunes to demonstrate the skills taught. Mp3 files of each tune are included for download in the course content as are pdfs of the chords, in both standard and ABC notation.

Jean's course is also available in his native French. There are two other courses available on guitar accompaniment in standard tuning from Cillian O'Dalaigh and one on DADGAD tuning from MJ

McMahon. The beauty of getting a subscription with OAIM is that you don't have to settle on just one course, subscription gives you access to them all. You could search and see what tune you want to learn and see what teacher is teaching it, or you could work your way up via your skill level, which in the case of guitar accompaniment would mean Jean teaches basic level, Cillian teaches intermediate and advanced and MJ's course is more suited to intermediate skill level.

So if guitar accompaniment is your thing, then the harvest is rich at OAIM. Their extensive library of backing tracks alone is worth the subscription. These Play Along Backing Tracks give you the opportunity to practice playing along with a melody and/or an accompaniment at 50, 75, or 100% speeds – which is a really practical way of improving your playing.

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CONAL Ó GRÁDA

Anú Abú

Raelach Records RR026, 15 Tracks, 58 Minutes www.raelachrecords.com

A dozen fresh young tracks from a veritable old head, recorded at Benny McCarthy's Doon studio and engineered by Billy Sutton. This is a follow up to Conal's solo album *Cnoc Buí* of 2008.

Ó Gráda leads out the tunes on the flute and is accompanied by Caoimhín O Fearghail (guitar, Greek bouzouki), Colm Ó Murchú (bodhrán), Caitríona Frost (marimba, drums, tambourine, brooms, jawbone) and Benny McCarthy (accordions-high chords, basses, sub basses, basse aux pied).

Full marks for the bilingual liner notes, concise context and insight into budgies, canaries and a drowned fox, which, to give you a hint, refer to a greedy hurler, a feline holiday, and a generous glass of wine. Conal's titles are wacky and whimsical, and his playing is full of life and humour. This is an unashamedly happy album.

It is another classic from Jack Talty's Raelach Records, which is building an impressive catalogue of some of the finest traditional playing of the 21st century. On hearing this I am sure Conal's new tunes will stick like limpets to the rocks of Bawn. Catchy quirky titles help, but in the tradition the quality of the tunes comes first, and what goodies we have. The bouncy and brill of Benny's Gone To Vegas, Fuip Out The Bugle, a clutch of K alliterating polkas, K Kung Fu Kate & The Karate Kid. Marches too, Tan Ann, Teacht Mhíl Espaînne (There was Once a Time, The Coming of the Milesians) contrasting the military fates of two ancestral armies.

Conal's tunes will be remembered not just because they have curious titles, but because they are addictive and they are offered in variety. He now lives in the Múscraí Gaeltacht, there's a set of slides that are no doubt sung in the locality: *An Dui-Ré* (The Dark Slide of the Moon), *Siúl sa bhFásach* (Walk on the Wild Slide). I could go on, but my closing words are: Conal's *Anú Abú* album is the very definition of a living tradition.

AILBE GRACE & LIAM FLANAGAN With special guest Mick O'Connor Across The Glen Own Label, 12 Tracks, 44 Minutes

Ailbe Grace is not known for being prolific, with just 2 albums in 20 years, the wait for this, his second album, has been well worth it.

Ailbe plays button box and Liam the fiddle, they are joined here by Jack Talty (piano), Eddie Costello (acoustic guitar) and Billy Sutton (bodhran). They met up with their old pal Mick O'Connor (banjo) at a gig at the Prince Albert pub in Whitton, London which furnishes two live tracks: the hornpipes *The Peacock's Feather/Cooley's/Cuz Teehan's* and the marches *Down The Brae/The Thatch*. (Down the Brae is on my "one to learn list"). The other tracks were recorded at Benny McCarthy's Doon studio in Waterford.

This is a short-run CD, and at the time of printing, it had already sold out at Custy's Music in Ennis. No surprise because it's one of the most engaging and evocative CDs produced this year.

There are selections here that you might know: Sergeant Early's Dream, Boys of Lough Gowna. The hornpipe Galway Bay, which they combine with The Smell of the Bog. A wonderful old slip jig Hardiman The Fiddler, the lads pair this with The Bridal and Mike McGoldrick's Farewell to Whalley Range, surely a modern classic? Another relatively new tune is a light-footed waltz written by Joanie Madden: Farewell to the Catchills.

The combination of fiddle and accordion is, of course, a classic in itself, and Ailbe and Liam bring a sense of confident ease and swing to every tune here. Nothing is rushed and neither is anything static; there's drive without eagerness, their tempo is always in the Goldilocks zone.

On a recent trip to the Cavan Fleadh from Cashel to Killeshandra, this album was my constant companion, we never tired of the road



and now it is an old friend. Across the Glen is a gem and it is surely a keeper.

Give Custy's a ring in Ennis and see if they can get some more in stock, hot cakes would be cool by comparison.

GRANNY'S ATTIC

Cold Blows the Wind

Grimdon Records GRICD010, 11 Tracks, 45 Minutes www.grannysattic.org.uk

Two very fine singers and two excellent musicians combine in this trio: George Sansome on vocals and guitar, Lewis Wood on fiddles, and Cohen Braithwaite-Kilcoyne on button boxes and vocals. Sid Goldsmith joins them on double bass. George and Cohen share the lead on eight songs here, each one exquisitely arranged to provide a huge variety of tones and textures. Every song has a heritage of more than a hundred years, some much longer, and most are well known in the English, Scots and Irish Traditions. Where the Swan Swims so Bonny is a version of the Two Sisters song of betrayal and murder. Claudy Banks is a cheerful story of a returning sailor, and The Nightingale is a more typical tale of press gangs and drownings.

The delicate side of Granny's Attic is nicely illustrated by their take on the English classic *Lovely Joan*, a very different betrayal given a slow and complex treatment here. *The False Bride* and *Jack the Sailor* are less well known, and each has a surprising twist, while *The Mermaid* and *Cold Blows the Wind* tell familiar tales of sea and land. Every song benefits from the instrumental prowess of this trio, and there are also three purely instrumental tracks, two old and one new. Lewis Wood's *Conversations* is a cheeky English reel which draws on tradition and adds a good pinch of party mood: the guitar and concertina parts accentuate its saucy aspect. *Bobbing Joe* is a master class in how to make Morris tunes interesting, and *New Allemand* juxtaposes the slow and the sprightly styles of English dance music.

Granny's Attic are a class act and this fourth album shows them at their best.

EMER O'FLAHERTY

Go dtí Seo

The role of the singer songwriter has been one of troubadour and newscaster. Whatever the vernacular, the function remains the same as does the song to quote Led Zeppelin. When it comes to songwriting in the Irish language as opposed to English, the same governing rules apply. Thus, Emer O'Flaherty finds herself in a growing niche as a predominantly Gaelic speaking singer-songwriter.

From Ennis she combines her commanding voice and lyrics with her multi-instrumental abilities on piano, organ, flute and tin whistle. With the increased popularity of spoken Irish, her debut album *Go dtí Seo* is a courageous and momentous release. For her influences she chases everything from sean-nós to contemporary forms and musically the mood is down tempo. However, it's not a gloomy affair, far from it as it aims for the deep heart's core and succeeds.

Ag Gearradh Romham is a resonant opener that highlights her strong distinctive vocals behind a stirring yet restrained backing. Ca Bhfuil Tu hides Baroque folk/rock roots while Staisun Traenach emits a poignant tale of romantic disappointment and departure seasoned by breathy flute and accordion. Neilli Bheag and Suantrai are melodic instrumental pieces that add further slow burning lustre. Hints of Laura Nyro and Shelagh MacDonald permeate the piano led musings like Grian Dubh, and jazz nuances also raise their head on Cuirt Baile Nua and Taibhse. Contrast is provided by a straight sean-nós delivery of Amhran Na Leabhair to a sparse piano backing where all the poignancy is evidently focused. The sole English language track Bird Interrupted neatly turns the tables proving equal giftedness in the Ango Saxon gloss.

This is music to dwell on, drink deeply from and wonder at her prowess. Emer O'Flaherty is a major new Irish songwriting talent. *Go dtí Seo* offers gems for after-hours deliberation.

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Freakshow is the upcoming genrebending release from New York based Sheridan Rúitín, bringing "Celtwave" to the edge of madness and melody. With songs that lurch from the raucous "Old Man Mickey" to the raw and poetic "North Georgia Mountains," this album is a folk-fueled fever dream stitched together with fiddle strings, grit, and boxes to squeeze.

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HARALD JUENGST Handpan Music To Soothe The Soul Liquid Sunshine Records LSR CD 02, 10 Tracks, 58 Minutes https://www.harald-juengst.com/

This is music for a dark room, scented candles, slow breathing and deep healing. Harald Juengst the genial German handpan player, Irish storyteller and often resident of Donegal, has released this album of handpan and monochord music in collaboration with Tyrone man Eamon McElholm of Solas fame, who adds piano, keyboards, programming and guitar, and his skills as an arranger and producer.

Harald has a home near Ranafast, it is handy for the airport and is within sight of the beach. For the past thirty or more years he's been part of the eclectic music scene around Gweedore. On this album he plays both the Handpan and monochord. Both are tuned in C# with the handpan having a pedal frequency of 432 Hertz, much more mellow and soothing than standard concert pitch. Tracks have one word titles, Tranquility, Parting, Forest, Time and so on. Harald's music really needs a new vocabulary to describe it, chords, melodies, beats and patterns don't really do it justice. For example on Simplicity there are pulses of percussion on the handpan, they in turn set free washes of ambient harmonies, which themselves are pure tones, and then there are the resonating strings from the monochord, the latter so delicately placed that you might miss them. The piano makes a cameo appearance towards the end of track 9 Dew Drop, as if to say "I'm a percussion instrument too". On Laura's Dream the handpan sends sound waves radiating as they ascend from their tapped root.

Track 6, *Parting* is perhaps the most complex and intense, the monochord brought in to make a musical punctuation, presaging the final cadence

PEGGY SEEGER

Teleology

Red Grape Music RGPSCD5, 11 Tracks, 35 Minutes www.peggyseeger.com

Now in her 90th year, Peggy Seeger has walked a hallowed path from her time working with her brother Mike Seeger, her involvement with Ewan McColl, more recently with Irene Scott, and she had also formed a partnership and toured with her sons Calum and Neil in a show of familial intimacy. Her solo work has contributed greatly to her legendary status and now comes what she says is her final recording, and one where she plans not to exit stage left gently but with a BANG. Its title refers to a philosophy that concerns itself with ends and goals not aspirations and causable factors.

Indeed, this album has a bang and punch to it in her observations and musings which offer a fitting personal tribute to over 70 years as a working musician, collector, composer, feminist and social activist. Peggy's voice and songwriting are still both major forces to be reckoned with. *Teleology* has nine brand new songs and two reinterpretations, including a new version of the classic *First Time Ever I Saw Your Face*. Written and recorded with family members, this album is suffused with love and respect. *Sing About the Hard Times* opens in a rousing chorus, mixing optimism and resilience with Peggy's voice out front. *I Want To Meet Paul Simon* offers clever wordplay on his song titles while the title track *Teleology* is confessional and *The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face* radiates shimmering desire in this new treatment, and at 90 sees Peggy making her recording debut playing piano.

The swampy Jazz/Blues shuffle of *Slow* and the march rhythm of *Sit-Down* address current issues and champion strength through unity. *Driftwood* tackles migration with empathetic humanity while *No Place Like Home* addresses the sense of worthlessness felt by the homeless. *Through The Clouds* and *Driftwood* both pack an emotional punch.

Teleology proves that Peggy Seeger's observational gifts are still intact and offers a powerfully resonant coda to a great folk career.

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TERESA HORGAN

Amethyst

Amethyst is Teresa Horgan's first solo album – but while this is her debut effort under her own sails, she has earned her stripes touring and recording with The Outside Track, Cuas, and other collaborations including one with guitarist Mossie Griffin.

Teresa Horgan, from County Cork, was immersed in music from a young age, playing whistle, flute and singing with her family. Having made a considerable impression, now comes her solo debut. *Amethyst* is where she lays claim to a space among Ireland's premier new female vocal spots. Indeed, its arrival is both warranted and well-deserved. Vocally she possesses a warm deep timbre which suits her material and her voice range. Much of the material is either traditional or gleaned from writers within the balladic form such as Brian MacNeil's in *Strong Women Rule Us All with Their Tears*. Her own *Far Across the Ocean* unveils a finely wrought compositional skill and traditional songs like *Sweet William's Ghost* and *Sovay* gain from fresh insights and intonation.

Tear My Stillhouse Down, No Ash will Burn and Deeper Well steer the proceedings into Lucinda Williams and Emmylou Harris territory adding a dash of Country Blues and Americana. Alan Burke's Will Jobling carries its message of injustice with righteous panache. Her comfort with Gaelic singing gives Eamon An Gnoic a collaboration with the late Seamus Begley a peaceful warmth. Teresa is helped by Donogh Hennessy, Martin Brunsden, Pauline Scanlon, Gerry O' Beirne, Barry Kerr, Niamh Varian-Barry and a host of renowned guest artists. Some of her family John, Catherine and Breda Horgan join her in performances which are both winsome and wistful.

By successfully mixing judiciously chosen material, subtle arrangements and sympathetic production framing Teresa's agile and beguiling vocals, *Amethyst* proves that Teresa Horgan is among our finest vocal talents.

PAT McCARTHY

Memories Recalled and Lost Own Label, 10 Tracks, 38 Minutes

This is the third CD in a series of original song releases from Kerry native Pat McCarthy. He spent a lifetime as an educator in Portmarnock Dublin and has blossomed as a singer songwriter and guitarist in the recent past.

Good times, good vibes and funny words are on offer on the first track: *Hair of The Dog*. Where Pat juxtaposes the jollity of pre-Christmas parties against the looming guilt-trip to the gym, and a necessary cleansing of the body after the Yuletide indulgence.

He takes a nostalgic trip back to his mother's homeplace outside Castleisland on *Loughfouder*, led out by a mandolin, his catchy chorus evoking happy childhood memories: "Take me back to sweet Loughfouder... where the spirit can run free.."

Two songs in the middle of the album take a closer look at isolation. Locked Up In Lockdown reminds us that back then we needed to find space in nature, a place to run with the rabbit, the fox and hare, a safety valve when our homes became too claustrophobic. The other extreme is visited in Under Charing Cross Bridge; what a powerful song about the homeless Irish who fell foul of the system after years of hard labour. Pat's voice is as strident, angry and authentic as anything sung by Luke Kelly in his prime.

The final track is upbeat on its surface, but carries a serious message, asking a question: do we judge a ballad singer as a person harshly, because they dare to sing a Rebel song or mention a Republican hero? Pat leaves us with the thought that as long as we sing about Pearce, Connolly and Tone, our history still belongs to us.

NATALIE PADILLA

Eostre

A very natural blend of Celtic and Americana, *Eostre* actually starts like a classical orchestra tuning up but then quickly slips into smooth oldtime fiddle and banjo on *Terra*, the first of nine tracks all by Natalie Padilla and all named for different gods or spirits from around the world. Although this is new music, it has an old soul - the gentle *Vayu* with its airy backdrop, the more urgent *Agni's* driving country beat, and the dreamy *Areg* with Padilla leading on guitar are all instantly appealing, easy listening but also inviting us to dance or play along.

Natalie plays fiddle, banjo and guitar, but she's not alone on this album. Producer Quinn Bachand plies his jazz guitar plus touches of fiddle and harmonica, Vancouver fiddle icon Daniel Lapp adds piano, and there's mountain dulcimer from Simon Chrisman. *Eostre* has no lyrics, no songs in that sense, but there are snatches of vocals from Béatrix Méthé woven into a rich carpet of sounds behind the melodies here.

Nigeria's forest spirit *Aja* must have attended a Flanagan Brothers concert in her youth: this piece bridges the gulf between Africa and Ireland with a gorgeous slow reel or barndance, followed by a crooked pair of Irish jigs dedicated to the *Ngen* spirits of the South American narrows. *Eostre* wraps up with an oldtime clawhammer banjo tune, a growling contemporary fiddle reel, and a country waltz to bring a tear to the eyes of Roman nature goddess Flora. I'll be learning this tune: it's so good, I can't believe it's not butter! Smooth, tasty, and true to the tradition - spread *Eostre* around, and sink your teeth into its final tear-it-up hoe-down medley.

HARTWIN DHOORE & ROSS GRANT

New Beginnings

Trad Records TRAD040, 5 Tracks, 21 Minutes www.hartwin.be

On the long side for an EP, but certainly shorter than a full album even by today's standards, this collection of five tracks nonetheless packs some weighty tunes, both new compositions and centuries-old nuggets from the Flemish and English traditions. Grant's fiddle and Dhoore's button box are the only sounds here, duetting on every track: no overdubbing or other musical alchemy aside from the magical interplay of two fine musicians. Box and fiddle fill the space with constant creativity in Hartwin's left-hand accompaniment and frequent double stops from Ross. This pair draws inspiration from the likes of Leveret and Naragonia: the similarities are apparent, and the space between them is almost negligible.

Four of Hartwin's own pieces provide almost half the material here. Opening with the title piece, a typically smooth and uplifting saunter in the Flemish style, he shifts into a laid-back jig which could be Celtic in the right light. The waltz *Green Café* brings us back to Belgium, a sunny afternoon on the town square perhaps, and contrasts nicely with Ross Grant's grinding reel *Gezellig*, which despite its pleasant Dutch name seems to originate close to the heart of old English fiddling. Other pieces here certainly do: *Cuckoo's Nest, Blew Bell Hornpipe*, and the plain-spoken *If You Will Not Have Me You May Let Me Go* from the 1770 Northumbrian Vickers manuscript.

New Beginnings winds down with Dhoore's Bonfire Tune, a quiet close to a very promising first chapter from this pair.

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THE RARE OLD MOUNTAIN DEW

This song has, for a very long time, been a staple of Irish ballads across the northern hemisphere, yet its origin lies in the Vaudeville theatres of 19th century New York. Take a dram with Seán Laffey.

merican readers may be familiar with the soft drink soda that goes by the name of Mountain Dew; this originated in Knoxville TN sometime between the 1930s and 1940s and was marketed as "zero-proof hill billy moonshine that will tickle your innards". The spirited Mountain Dew in the lyrics we print below is much stronger stuff.

In many respects this is the quintessential Irish drinking song, yet the title is a little off-kilter. Mountain Dew is more commonly a Scots Irish or an American term for illicit whiskey. After a search online I found in Green's Dictionary of Slang (500 years of the Vulgar Tongue) a note

work well in the dramatic setting of musical comedy. Easy to remember, it became popular and slipped into the ill-defined world of folk song, so much so that Colm O Lochlan writing in 1938 said he collected it in 1916 and the words were by Phil O'Neill from Kinsale.

One of the lines hints at its American origins: 'the sweet poitin from Ireland green, distilled from wheat and rye'. Barley, the starting point of choice for Irish whiskey, grew poorly in America. Instead rye whiskey was produced there, the rye seeds were imported from Germany with its similar hot continental summers. And of course, back home in Ireland real poitín was often made from malted barley

from the Inverness Courier of 12th December 1838: 'The peasantry pledged the health of the Laird and his lady in overflowing bumpers of mountain dew.'

The Ulster Scots Academy cites its origins to the early 19th century America, stating 'mountain dew. Home-made, illicit poitín or whiskey. The Oxford English Dictionary dates the term only from 1826 and has no citations from Ireland'.

The song itself was penned by Ned Harrigan around 1881 with music by David Braham. The tune is a variant of *The Girl I Left Behind Me/ Brighton Camp/ Spailpín Fánach*, which was already over 100 years old when Harrigan included *The Rare Old Mountain Dew* in his 1882 musical comedy *The Blackbird*. It is a short song that would

and potatoes, not wheat nor rye. A gauger, the correct term, others are used wrongly, was an inspector who would levy the tax (duty) on spirits; this was determined by their strength (proof) which was a measure of the drink's alcohol content.

The song is referenced in Shane MacGowan's Fairytale of New York and it has been recorded many times. Indeed when the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem resorted to singing it in the White Horse Tavern in Greenwich Village in their impromptu ballad sessions after a night treading the boards in the nearby Cherry Tree Theater, they were (almost) bringing the song home to its paternal roost.

so take off your coat, and grease your throat with the real old mountain dew.



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












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
